

Dear Friends,

This May edition of the parish magazine comes on the back of Easter joy and the hope of new life found in the risen Christ. As trees, plants, and flowers have been waking up in spring, now with warmer and longer days, we anticipate summer coming and enjoying the surrounding countryside and garden spaces that God has given us to nurture and enjoy. Moving from spring to summer, reminds me what had been lying dormant is now coming to life, to blossom and will bear fruit. From a resurrection perspective, despite all the troubles of the world, we can hold onto our Lord who has conquered death, confident that Jesus has the last word over the injustice and suffering we know of too well.

May is a busy time for Christians, remembering, celebrating, and being reminded of God's power and purposes in our world. Jesus Christ was gone, but He promised to send the Holy Spirit to help us and be our guide, so Christians rededicate their dependency on God during this time.

Before Jesus ascended he commanded his followers to go and tell the good news to those who would listen, that same command remains for us today, with proclamation is the call to live and to 'be' the good news and demonstrate God's love. I leave you with a sonnet for Ascension Day by Malcom Guite.

We saw his light break through the cloud of glory
Whilst we were rooted still in time and place
As earth became a part of Heaven's story
And heaven opened to his human face.
We saw him go and yet we were not parted
He took us with him to the heart of things
The heart that broke for all the broken-hearted
Is whole and Heaven-centred now, and sings,
Sings in the strength that rises out of weakness,
Sings through the clouds that veil him from our sight,
Whilst we ourselves become his clouds of witness
And sing the waning darkness into light,
His light in us, and ours in him concealed,
Which all creation waits to see revealed.

The May

With the may blossoming in the many hedges and spring hope in the air, May Day has a spark about it. First mentioned in 1240 by a bishop complaining his clergy were getting involved in (he assumed) risqué village games for the 'bringing-in of May', its energy has somewhat evaporated. Given our national undervaluing of manual labour (discuss!—letters to the editor must be accompanied by a large box of chocolates), the earnest International

Workers' Day took 100 years to make it into this country and has now fizzled out. So maybe all we now want on $1^{\rm st}$ May is a day off work.

May poles were still going in 1950s schools as a folk tradition, with their complicated interweaving of the colourful ribbons by both agile and blundering children. But you needed more of a celebration to bring out the whole community. This area was on the western edge of the 'garlanding' region of the country. Joseph Stevens, St Mary Bourne village doctor and antiquarian of the mid-19th century, wrote nostalgically of the colourful May Day celebration of the past. Even in his day it was a shadow of what it had been:

'Aged people remembered when the place was decorated with green boughs, and a maypole was erected at Whitsuntide, the blowing of horns, an old custom on May Day, had its survival at St Mary Bourne, fifty years ago, in boys making "May horns" of willow bark twisted in a spiral manner. But the May Day rejoicings at that time had dwindled down to a band of half washed chimney sweeps decorated with coloured papers and ribbons, who danced round a walking bower, which enclosed a female of their order, the representative probably of Maid Marian of the olden times. They extracted what music could be elicited from the contact of shovels and brushes. Later, the village festival survived as "Garland Day", when all that remained to tell of the rejoicing of the past were little children bearing miniature bowers from house to house, chanting "Please to see my garland".' Parochial History (1888), p.188.

Mrs Innes (local historian of St Mary Bourne, writing in 1944) adds a flavour of what took place in the 1820s:

'Tradition still tells of the parades of rather over a hundred years ago when the seven daughters of the Vicar, the Rev. W.E. Easton (six of whom are buried in the churchyard) led the procession through the village on May Day, dressed in white muslin and blue ribbons. The former elaborate cage of flowers, with its girl occupant, is no longer seen, but children come round with pretty bunches of spring flowers from the copses tied to a flat piece of wood, sing their rhymes and knock for their penny. The most usual rhyme runs:-

First of May is garland day, Second of May is step-toe day, Knock at the knocker, Ring at the bell, Please for a penny for singing so well."

No-one seems to know what a step-toe day was, except possibly a painful prank when boys used to try to step on each other's toes.

In case anyone's thoughts are running along the bishop's line, those historians who research such things have confirmed there was no peak in birth statistics nine months after May Day, in the period post 1530s when numbers started to be recorded in church registers. The night of 30 April was typically too cold to spend in the woods or under hedgerows.



HURSTBOURNE PRIORS IN FASHION

The death of Dame Mary Quant on 13 April, aged 93, have produced many tributes to her career as a 'fashion revolutionary' designer in the 'Chelsea Set' in the 1950s-60s. In the justly deserved celebration of her abilities as designer and entrepreneur, it is unlikely that her connection to Hurstbourne Priors will be mentioned. In 1957 she married Alexander Plunket Greene (1932-1990), a name which should ring a local bell. Alexander was the only son of Richard George Hubert Plunket Greene (1901-1978), who is buried in St Andrew's churchyard, near his father, Harry, and brother, David. For Alexander was the grandson of the celebrated Anglo-Irish baritone solo singer, writer and fly-fisherman, Harry Plunket Greene, who lived in the village from 1902 to 1913, with his wife, Gwen, daughter of Sir Hubert Parry.








Village Centre News

Will Taverner, (from Jamaica Farm) had his first serious go at the triple jump, aged 16 last summer 2022. Before that, he was focussed on rugby (winger) and cross country running. With no serious training he was entered into a local competition of schools in Salisbury and surprised himself (and the coach) when he jumped an amazing 12m 66cm! This massive jump, without preparation or expectation, meant that he then qualified for the County



Championships. This time he surprised himself, the coach and his parents by jumping an incredible 13 metres, and that then qualified him for the Regional Championships (SW England). This led to Will being entered for the English Schools National Championship in the Intermediate boys group, (aged 15 to 16) held in Manchester. He came in the top ten.

The result is that he has had to focus on the Triple Jump and withdraw his interest in middle-distance running and rugby. Additional summer holiday competitions led to Will being accepted onto the England Athletics Youth talent programme. This means he gets training from exprofessionals and advice from a multi-disciplinary team, including nutrition and sports psychology. He has travelled to Bath, Birmingham and Loughborough for training during the course of this term with some indoor competitions having taken place over the winter. England Athletics send invitations to the top twenty athletes for both the training programme and entry into competitions across the country. Will was one of those.

Summer 2023 will see him flying through the air! When it all comes together, the hop, skip, and the jump, Will says: 'It's exhilarating. It's better than the rugby and the running'. He loves it. He'll be too young for the 2024 Olympics, but watch this space for the triple jump in 2028! Good luck Will and well dome.

Go Star Gazing in May

5 May - Full Moon - Moon will be located on opposite side of the Earth as its face will be fully illuminated. Known as Flower Moon by early Native American tribes.



May 5 - Penumbral Lunar Eclipse - This occurs when the Moon passes through the Earth's partial shadow, or penumbra. During this type of eclipse, the Moon will darken slightly but not completely.

May 6-7 - Eta Aquarid Meteor Shower - Above average producing 60 meteors per hour. Most of activity seen in Southern Hemisphere. The nearly full moon will be a problem blocking out all but brightest meteors. Best viewing will be from dark locations after midnight.

May 19 - New Moon - Moon will be located on same side as the Earth & the Sun. Best time to observe galaxies & star clusters as there is no light to interfere.

May 29 - Mercury at its Greatest Western Elongation -This is best time to view Mercury as it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning. Look for Mercury low in the eastern sky just before sunrise. **SEASONED FIREWOOD**



Top tips for May

- 1. Plant your cotton pants on the last May Bank Holiday to take part in the Holiest Pants competition at the Flower Show (see SMB page 1 above).
- 2. Watering the garden? Use rainwater or 'grey water' (left over

washing up water, bath water etc).

- Planting, moving or splitting plants? Dig in lots of compost to feed them and help soil retention.
- 4. In hot weather, water in the evenings to reduce evaporation.
- When the soil is damp, mulch plants to retain moisture.
- Sow seeds or buy small plug plants, rather than buying large expensive plants.
- 7. Buy peat free compost to preserve the world's remaining peat bogs.

Postcard from Binley

In response to last month's "Postcard" three emails have come flooding in. One from a lady who mistook the word "forager" for "foreigner" and suggested I'd gone all "Farage". Another from a chap who has actually eaten badger ham and pronounced it revolting and thirdly, from someone who sympathised with me over the loss of toilet roll innards and reminded me how important these things were to him as a child as they were an intrinsic part of making things, alongside plastic detergent bottles. And of course, he's absolutely right. Children were allowed to be creative; you could build Notre Dame from toilet roll innards and Fairy Liquid bottles. You just needed glue, gallons of it. Something I would imagine is now kept in the school safe under lock and key. And of course, once you had built Notre Dame you then decorated it, your desk, chair and yourself with poster paints in every garish hue imaginable. I can still smell that sour odour. But I suppose kids now just sit there glumly staring at a screen. I rather hope not but I'm a natural pessimist.

Here in Binley, we have experienced one of the coldest Springs in recent times. The Phormiums that I have had here for 30 years are no more, crippled by that late snow and wicked frost. As are so many other plants. It's heart breaking but we go on. To appreciate nature, one really needs to get out there amongst it and I have been busier than tits on a fat ball, pruning, clipping, clearing, and burning. All around me new life was beginning and as I write just a few yards from me wrens have fledged and are bombing around like drunken bees. Glorious! And never mind the first cuckoo of Spring (which I've yet to hear), as I walked the banks of the Bourne yesterday on a rare warm afternoon, I witnessed a hatch of Hawthorn and heard the first "plop" of a trout as a fish rose and took one. And I see on social media that George Stephenson in St Mary Bourne has his first fish of the season; a plump, fin perfect heavily spotted Brownie. I have been fortunate to fish with George, and what a pleasure it was to do so with such a genuinely skilled fly caster and countryman. But I have an addiction to running water and would happily sit by a trickling ditch for hours. There is so much to see that goes on above and below the surface, and the beauty of our chalk streams is the extraordinary clarity. They run like Tanqueray.

My wife presented me with a book the other day, "The last English Poachers". It chronicles the life and times of Bob and Brian Tovey and their battles and exploits with the landed gentry, gamekeepers, and the police of South Gloucestershire. I knew Bob reasonably well when he would knock around these parts as an acquaintance of Joe Hirst and the Alresford and Oxford coursing clubs. He certainly was an interesting character; neither he nor his son had ever had much formal education but his knowledge on nature and the countryside was encyclopedic. I once asked him if it were true, you could soak raisins in brandy, scatter them on the woodland floor then come back a few hours later and just pick the inebriated, sleeping pheasants up off the ground and put them in a sack? He laughed at that but I'm willing to bet

he tried it, when he wasn't shooting trout, lamping salmon, coursing hares or roasting hedgehogs. "I leaves the feet on 'im as I likes it that way but you can snip 'em off if you prefers... And they say the meat's very good for baldness."

The book is not for the squeamish, it shows nature's tooth and claw at its reddest. However, it does document a time when "taking one for the pot" was pretty much a countryman's birth right and was done almost more for the thrill than the satisfaction of a full stomach. Having one up on the gentry was certainly Bob's motivation and he doesn't hold back on naming those he transgresses.

Let he who is without sin cast the first stone because I once found myself crawling through undergrowth with an Irish ghillie who was so determined I should catch a fish he was prepared to break the law to achieve it which we did on the Duke of Devonshire's water at Careysville. Fun times!

But the book has some lyrical gems in the form of old country words that the Tovey's use as common language. "Shadowtackle", meaning the shifting patterns of light and shade on woodland floors. A "Hedgemumper" is a nosey parker and a "Grunty" is a tough guy. The toffs are generally known as "Ya-Ya's" or "Yoikes".

And mindful I'm becoming a little "Chopsy" I'll end it there! $N\!A$



Light TouchSave Every Drop

Here in Hampshire, we often take for granted something that is actually an incredible luxury; clean water brought

directly into our homes. With this precious natural resource available at the turn of a tap it can be easy to overlook where it comes from, and to forget about leaving a share for nature. In the Bourne valley our water supply is literally taken from the chalk aquifer deep under our feet by a process called abstraction. This process sucks the precious water out of the aquifer just like using a straw to drink an icy slush puppy. We aren't the only ones using this hidden store: Our beautiful chalk

streams wonderful wildlife can suffer if there isn't enough to fill the rivers each spring. Hampshire's population is growing fast, and climate change is bringing greater risk of floods and drought. This puts pressure on our water supply and is another reason there is less water to go round.



The local Wildlife Trust's Watercress and Winterbournes project has teamed up with Southern Water with "Save Every Drop" to supply **free home visits** to give water saving advice



to households on a water meter with fairly high consumption. They can also fit several free water saving devices to your taps, shower heads and toilets. For example their free shower heads save up to 30 litres per 4 minute

shower and their tap aerators save up to 8 litres per minute. These devices will save you money going into the future too. There is even a leaky loo test to do to save you up to 72 litres a day. Just make sure you quote W&W when you apply on www.southernwater.co.uk/water-saving-home-visits

Remembering...

Jonathan Baxter

30th June 1975 - 20th February 2023

Jon was born in June 1975 to Fred and Andrea Baxter at Rinteln, Germany where Jon's father was stationed in the army. When he was 3 years old, the family relocated back to the UK and settled in Grantham, Lincolnshire. After his education at Kings Grammar School, Grantham and unsure which direction his life would take, Jon found himself in an Army Recruitment Centre.

This was the beginning of a very successful army career that started in the REME. Jon was soon selected for officer training at Sandhurst and from there he joined the Royal Engineers. Tours of Bosnia, Northern Ireland, Cyprus, Iraq and Afghanistan followed. Just before a 2 year posting



to Northern Ireland, Jon met his wife-to-be, Sam.

Gordon Clifford Martin was born on 27th October 1938 in Balderton, Newark, Nottinghamshire. He was the seventh and youngest child of William and Florence Martin.

In early life Gordon missed a lot of schooling due to ill health, but he was a good student and became head boy of his secondary school. He enjoyed woodwork, athletics, and especially football where he ended up playing for various local teams. He left school at 15 and started an apprenticeship where he learned the skill of technical drawing which would later inform his career path. Aged 16, Gordon met the "love of his life", Anne Smith, in the grounds of Newark Castle. They married in April 1961 at Newark Christ Church and had their honeymoon in London.

They were married for 61 years and Gordon considered himself very fortunate.

Gordon and Anne bought their first house, in Woodbine Terrace, Newark, for just over a thousand pounds. Their first son Gary was born there in 1963, with Nigel coming along 3 years later.

By the age of 33 Gordon was a chief designer and he became a Company Director at Rothwell Engineering. This brought the opportunity to move down south and so the family settled in St Mary Bourne where Gordon continued to love being involved with football, a passion he shared with Nigel and eventually with his third grandchild, Luke.

In March 1992 Nigel and Berni produced Anne and Gordon's first grandchild, Hannah. Their second grandchild Andrew, born to Gary and Julie, came along 18 months later.

Gordon was enormously proud of his two sons and adored all three of his grandchildren. The grandchildren all had such fun with him, with fond memories of non-stop laughter, jokes and singing. In 2021 he was delighted by the birth of his first great-grandchild, Fiadh Kelleher.

Last Christmas morning he commented that he and Anne were truly blessed: "2 smashing sons, 3 lovely grandchildren, and now a beautiful great-grand daughter it doesn't get much better than that, does it?"

Gordon was a lifelong fan of Nottingham Forest and continued to play football himself until the mid-1960s. He was manager of the St Mary Bourne Football Club for a few years and also helped out with Hurstbourne Tarrant Sunday team. He retired in 2013 and continued to thoroughly enjoy his time in St Mary Bourne with a great group of friends who met regularly in the George Inn.

Gordon passed away peacefully on 21st February, with Nigel and Berni at his bedside.

Our sympathies go to Anne and all the family at this sad time.

John Paice of 8 Stoke Gate, Stoke who passed away on 12th March 2023 aged 92.

John was born in Micheldever, the youngest child of Frank and Florence. He had a brother Les and sister Cath. He left school at 14 and began his working life doing arable work at Ranks in Sutton Scotney. He worked on farms all his life and was particularly fond of the horses he worked with there. He met June at a youth club evening in the Village Hall in Sutton Scotney and they married on 4th April 1953. After working at Ranks, the family moved to Woodmancote, and then came on to work on the Strauss's farm at Stoke. They had one son, Keith who married Kathy. They gave John and June two much-loved grandsons: Matthew and Daniel.

John and June had a long and happy married life together which lasted nearly 70 years.

John is remembered as a cheerful and good-humoured man who was always fair. There was no pretence about him. When he was recently in hospital, the doctors suggested a brain scan but John joked "save the money. There's nothing left in there to find" and when they suggested an overnight stay, he refused "I've had my turn. One of the younger ones needs a bed more than me".

John Paice was a good man who is remembered and honoured by those who knew him. RIP

LONGPARISH WILDLIFE THE WATER RAIL

Water Rails are usually a secretive bird only seen occasionally in and out of the reeds. The one in the little stream seems quite tame and poses for photos.

They are smaller than the Moorhen. It is a long billed, little marsh bird, with a rather weak flight but very nimble. It is dark brown above and slate-blue below, with white-barred black flanks and a



red bill. The nest is just above the water level in thick vegetation. It is made of leaves and plant stems. Vegetation around the nest is often pulled over to make a canopy. The eggs are laid early, usually in the last week of March and a second clutch is not unusual. The eggs are oval in shape, off-white spotted, and blotched by red brown at one end. Each clutch consists of 6 to 11 eggs and are incubated for 19-22 days. The young will leave the nest a few days after hatching. Their food is mostly insects and a small amount of plant material.

I saw my first Swallow on the 27th of March, 2 days earlier than last year and House Martin on the 9th of April, 10 days earlier than last year.

For those of you who did the big garden bird count this year. This year Birdwatch 2023 had 540,000 participants.

that bunnies would love – and your little ones will too. Tasting of lime not courgette, you're sneaking in the green stuff, and they won't even care!

Why not make some fun rabbit crafts too, whilst they bake?

Rabbit's Muffins

Ingredients:

- 125g Courgette
- 1 medium Egg
- 60ml Vegetable oil
- 75g Caster sugar
- 115g Self-raising flour
- 1 tsp Baking powder
- Juice and zest of 1 lime

How do I make that?

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 180 C.
- 2. Grate the courgette onto a clean j-cloth and squeeze out as much juice as you can.
- 3. In a mixing bowl, beat the egg with the vegetable oil and sugar until light and fluffy.
- 4. Stir in the flour and baking powder, then mix in the grated courgette, lime zest and juice.
- 5. Divide the mixture between 6 muffin cases in a tin.
- 6. Bake for 20 25 minutes until risen and golden, then cool on a wire rack.

If you like, you could decorate them with icing made by mixing 100g icing sugar with a little extra fresh lime juice – however, we find you just don't need it! These muffins (un-iced) freeze beautifully for a last-minute lunchbox addition too.

Tabasco – Avery Island

So, at the end of March our Longparish Editor, Angie bundled me into a suitcase and threw me in an aeroplane to visit her family in New Orleans. I married her, so I guess I signed up for this. Depending on how often you spend staring at the labels on your sauce bottles at dinner time, you may or may not be aware that Louisiana is home to Tabasco Hot Sauce and all its derivatives.

Tabasco is still made on Avery Island, LA. I admit that I was expecting to find it out in the Gulf of Mexico and not in the swamps. The 'Island' is actually a salt mine, surrounded by lower lying land which floods in the wet season. They continue to mine the salt and use it in the sauce making process. The mash that is made before the sauce is aged in salt capped oak barrels for up to three years. It smells awful and incredible at the same time. A school group visiting at the same time as us were running away holding their noses.



Tabasco is made by the Mcllhenny Company, founded by Edmund Mcllhenny in 1868 and still family owned. Mcllhenny disliked the bland food available during the reconstruction of the South, so he made his own sauce to spice things up a bit.

The island is set up great for visiting tourists. The store gives you the chance to try all the flavours on pretzel sticks, and there are several flavours you will not find in England, so it is worth stocking up if you like an unusual one. The restaurant sold great food, especially the seafood, which is always great in Louisiana. The museum is interesting and full of family artifacts and most days you can watch the factory generating thousands of bottles of sauce.



In addition to Tabasco, Avery Island is a nature reserve set up by one of the descendants to preserve the wildlife in the area. It is designed to be driven around, although you can get out wherever you wish and explore on foot. The garden is full of blooming flowers, 400-year-old trees, and a variety of wildlife. It's up to you to avoid the gators.
