

# A message from Rev Canon Dodie Marsden about healing human relationships

Archbishop Desmond Tutu (1931–2021) and his daughter Mpho Tutu offer these thoughts about forgiveness for people across the world.

They ask: From whom do we need forgiveness? To whom do we need to offer forgiveness? What have you or I done? Have we hurt someone we love? Is there pain and anguish?

It is not hard to see how these questions arose coming out of South Africa's peace and reconciliation forum.

The simple truth is we all make mistakes, and we all need forgiveness. There is no magic wand we can wave to go back in time and change what has happened or undo the harm that has been done. But we can do everything in our power to set right what has been made wrong. We can endeavour to make sure the harm never happens again.

There are times when each of us have been thoughtless or selfish or cruel. Yet, it is not easy to admit one's wrongdoing and ask for forgiveness.

"I am sorry" are perhaps the three hardest words to say.

When we are willing to let down our defences and look honestly at our actions, we find there is a great freedom in asking for forgiveness, and great strength in admitting the wrong. This is how we free ourselves from our past errors. It is how we are able to move forward into our future, unfettered by the mistakes we have made.

The introduction to 'The Book of Forgiving' written by Archbishop Desmond Tutu & Mpho Tutu says something very moving and so good I have highlighted it in bold: The quality of human life on our planet is nothing more than the sum total of our daily interactions with one another.

In August, Michael Parkinson died after a highly respected career hosting a TV talk show for thirty-six years. When he was asked which was his favourite interview, he said the one that stood out from all the others was the interview with Dr Jacob Bronowski, who wrote and presented a series for the BBC called *The Ascent of Man* in the 1970s.

Bronowski talked about questions relating to human value and, describing his harrowing experience filming at Auschwitz, he said: 'The crime is about a breakdown in relationship between one human being and another'.

There is so much truth in the wisdom of these writers. I will finish with a prayer from Desmond Tutu and a story from Bronowski.

#### The Prayer

I want to be willing to forgive but I dare not ask for the will to forgive in case you give it to me, and I am not yet ready. I am not yet ready for my heart to soften. I am not yet ready to be vulnerable again.

Not yet ready to see that there is humanity in my tormentor's eyes.

Or that the one who hurt me may also have cried.

I am not yet ready for the journey. I am at the prayer before the prayer of forgiveness.

Grant me the will to want to forgive.
Grant it to me, not yet but soon.
I can glimpse all the shattered pieces
of that fragile thing:

That soul trying to rise on the broken wings of hope,

but only out of the corner of my eye.
Is there a place where we can meet?
You and me - the place in the middle
The no man's land
Where we straddle the lines.
Where you are right and I am right too,
And both of us are wrong and wronged.
Can we meet there?

And look for the place where the path begins The path that ends when we forgive.

#### The Story

Bronowski was visiting the Holy Land: He asked the taxi driver to take him up to Calvary Hill. The reply came; "I can't drive you all the way. You have to walk some of it yourself".

So, the choice to forgive is up to each of us individually.

Although we can seek help from others on the way, we must walk that personal and perhaps difficult path on our own. But the rewards are enormous.

# REPORT FROM PLANNING COMMITTEE MEETING ON 21 AUGUST

The Parish Council had **STRONG OBJECTIONS** to:

#### REPORT FROM PC MEETING ON 11 SEPTEMBER

#### PERIOD FOR PUBLIC SPEAKING

The head teacher from Longparish School presented a draft proposal to build an outdoor classroom and improve play equipment in the grounds of the school. Councillors offered advice about sources of grant funding, and recommended seeking planning advice from TVBC before commencing any build.

#### **PLANNING**

The PC agreed that **NO PRIOR APPROVAL IS REQUIRED** for an extension to an agricultural machinery storage building at **Longparish Estate**, **Longparish**.

It was agreed that a member of the council would make representation at the Northern Area Planning Committee meeting in relation to the planning application for **River Test Distillery**.

# UPDATES FROM WORKING PARTY & COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES

As there had been no full council meeting since July, the Working Party Chairmen and other council representatives were given the opportunity to provide a brief account of their current work to the PC. The Village Design Statement working party had produced and circulated a document analysing the recent survey results and will give a more detailed presentation at the October PC meeting. The chairman of the Open Spaces & Footpaths working party summarised the recent village inspection, reporting repairs at the playground that had taken place. The inspection also highlighted tree work that is needed in the village hall car park, and also the need to repair the war memorial in the cemetery. The Communications working party chairman reported that work to improve the new website continues, and training for page editors is being planned. The **North Acre working party** is yet to meet formally but plans to discuss the ongoing issues with parking in the estate as a priority.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

Plea to Property owners – it is time to cut back hedges that border roads or footpaths

Under the Highways Act, roadside hedges are the responsibility of the landowner who has to: Prevent the

hedge from overhanging the highway. Prevent hedges from obscuring streetlights and road signs. Clear the road of debris after hedges have been cut. <a href="https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/roadmaintenance/roadproblems/treehedge">https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/roadmaintenance/roadproblems/treehedge</a>

Residents can report problem hedges on the Hampshire website, this may result in Highways cutting back the hedge, but the bill will be sent to the property owner, so property owners are well advised to keep hedges cut back from the road or right of way to avoid a hefty bill.


# EXCITING NEW FUNDRAISING PROJECT FOR LONGPARISH C.E PRIMARY SCHOOL

In previous editions of Hill and Valley, we have shared with you how the children at Longparish Church of England Primary School love being on the field and in the copse during play and lunchtimes; den building, collecting sticks and generally enjoying being out in nature with their friends. It is a very special and unique part of the Longparish life here in school. It is also a much recognised fact that outdoor learning and play improves children's physical development, supports mental health and wellbeing, deepens nature connection, and promotes more inclusive and engaging learning.

Last year, thanks to the tremendous fundraising by the FoLS (PTA) we developed the Early Years space outside. This year we have even bigger fundraising ambitions and exciting plans to further develop our school grounds.


Beside the playground is our trim trail. A series of wooden structures that the children love to climb on. However, this is over 15 years old and already some of it is condemned and not usable for children. Sitting behind this is a strip of land beside the boundary to the river.

We want to replace our trim trail and at the same time build a raised 'lookout' classroom. Being raised off the ground this will become a 'hide' for children to spot wildlife on the River Test. We know that there is a Kingfisher, whose territory is along the stretch of the river by our field. We also have a strong suspicion that there is an otter in the area. Currently though, children are oblivious to the magic and wonder that sits the other side of the fence.



Our intention is to create a soft and very natural looking structure that will sit well in this beautiful countryside setting, using natural cedar and sweet chestnut timber materials. Around the structure we will then introduce low-maintenance wildflowers, sensory planting and shrubs that will, once established, attract birds, flying insects and minibeasts – the planting will also have the effect of creating a magical surround to the structure that the children will pass through on the way to the lookout platform, blending it into the river landscape beyond. The trim trail will be similarly made. Austere fencing will be replaced by a variety of softer woven panels.

The lookout classroom will be a space that can be used all year round, for a range of different activities and learning opportunities, not just as a nature 'hide'.



This is an exciting project that we know the children will love and will be a fantastic addition to the school. It will enhance and enrich learning opportunities for all our children and will help to sustain the capacity of the village school in the years to come.

However, it is a big fundraising project for a school operating on very tight budget restraints. We have an active PTA who are very excited to play a large part in helping us raise this money and we are also going for grants and other avenues of funding.

Your support in any capacity will be much appreciated. In next month's edition we will share with you how our newly elected school council children are playing an active role in deciding what our trim trail activities are.



#### LONGPARISH WILDLIFE -BADGERS


Badgers are nocturnal and very rarely seen during the




day. There is a small Badger sett not far from North Acre. You may be lucky enough to see one whilst driving down the Middleway at night. Badgers have a black and white-striped face, grey fur,

and a short furry tail. It's a stocky animal with powerful claws. They typically weigh 10-12kg with a body length of 90cms. This makes them the biggest land predator in the UK. Between 4-7 live in a network of tunnels called a sett. The main sett is where they spend most of their time with outlying setts used occasionally. Badgers are fussy; on a sunny day they will bring their bedding (grass and leaves) out for some fresh air. Badgers are omnivores which mean they eat a wide range of food. Mostly earth worms, they can eat hundreds in a single night. They will also eat slugs and snails, and small mammals including hedgehogs. Badgers start mating in February-May but after mating, a process known as delayed implantation occurs. This means the cubs will not be born until the following February regardless of when mating occurred. Youngsters will remain underground for two months before emerging. They reach maturity at just over a year. Some will stay with the family others will leave to find their own territory. Recently they have been culled due to being suspected tuberculosis carriers and potentially giving it to cattle.

It's been a funny year with the weather, some birds have had a good breeding season like the Tits. But I don't think Swallows and House Martins have done too well. Heavy rains making feeding more difficult.



#### **Caterpillar Spotted!**

Spotted at the Hurstbourne Priors recreation ground in August.

This caterpillar is recognisable by the tufts of long yellow or orange hairs with a series of white, purple edged spots and a black head. Despite their bright colour, these caterpillars are not poisonous.

The caterpillars feed on various maple, horse chestnut and mulberry leaves and large leaved lime.

The adult Sycamore Moths (Acronicta Aceris) have a wingspan 35-45mm and are a more subtle white-grey colour. They fly at night and are attracted to light and sugar.

These moth can be found from central England as far south as Morocco.

#### What's Been Happening at the Mill?

We've been very busy with various events and with the summer holiday children's 'Play Town' in the Mill building and grounds. Families have said the Mill is an incredible place to make summer memories and enjoy imaginative play with family and friends. Elsewhere in the Mill, business has continued as normal

The café has been filled with visitors and locals, shop sales have been good, and our weavers have been occupied producing cotton throws for sale in the shop and weaving a monochrome version of our 'Sophia' silk, called 'Hutchence', which was 19th-century Mill worker Sophia Whipp's maiden name. Sophia started working at the Mill as a child and continued to do so for roughly 60 years!

#### What We Are Weaving

We are currently working on the 'The Hide', the next scarf in our previous owner's collection.

The Hide family have played a vital part in the survival of the Mill to date. On 6 November 1886, the Mill was sold by auction at The White Hart Hotel in Whitchurch. It was bought by local shopkeeper and draper John Hide for his son James. In 1911 John Hide died, leaving James sole owner of the Mill.

Throughout this period, the Mill wove silk for Burberry, producing 22 different colours of lining for their famous raincoats. James Hide remained the owner of the Mill until 1956 when Stephen Walters & Durchased it and continued the production of silk.

To this day the Hide family remain connected with the Mill. Liz Hide, a relative of James, is one of the Trustees.

#### **Lookback at Andover 2023**

This year's edition of the annual journal of the Andover History and Archaeology Society (AHAS) published on 22 September contains a very informative article on Kathleen Innes, née Royds, 1883-1967, St Mary Bourne's foremost 20th century historian. But she was so much more, in her rich, varied, and international life. In her article, Erica Tinsley, chair of AHAS, describes her as 'Writer, educator and campaigner for peace.' Kathleen's is a very remarkable story and with her husband, George, their contribution to village life was considerable, including building the old village centre (1953-1992).

There is also a contribution by Phyllis Rich, the much-loved wife of Frank, farmer of Bourne Farm, Gangbridge Lane. She lived there from their marriage in 1952 until her death last December. With the help of her daughter, Catherine, Phyllis recalled her childhood in Picket Twenty and enjoyment of the Andover Down Sunday School, run by the farmer's wife there. The article on the history of the hamlet of Andover Down is also a tribute to Phyllis' memory.



#### **Parish Council Activities**

#### Planning Solar Farm:

The council have returned a list of additional questions to the planners before a decision is made. Aspects such

as national grid infrastructure and disruption to the Harroway for residents are key points which need more information. Not to mention the AONB in which the solar panels will reside. This is a landmark application of this type within the local area and one in which considerate and careful decisions need to be made.

#### **SMB Pavilion:**

The use of this building by both cricket teams (Snr and Jnr) as well as Ninnys (during the week) over this summer has been to see if all parties can be accommodated. Initially this was a short-term option, but looking forwards, this is a trial process for the combined usage of a building.

All parties have been in communication over summer and if it is successful, this could be the start of a financial model for the redevelopment of the pavilion itself and the play area and MUGA.

A meeting will be planned for all interested parties over the next few weeks, along with all users of this space. Please keep an eye on notice boards and the PC-FB page for more information.

# Hill & Valley Small Beer

The 19<sup>th</sup> century writer, Richard Jefferies, of the hamlet



of Coate, now an outlier of Swindon, was an acute observer of the countryside and rural life, and often lyrical about the natural world. But he knew not everything in the garden was rosy. In his essay, *One of the New Voters*, \* he introduces 'Roger, the reaper', who had slept all night in the cowhouse.

'He had no difficulty in sleeping, first because his muscles had been tried to the utmost, and next because his skin was full to the brim, not of jolly "good ale and old" but of the very smallest and poorest of wish-washy beer. In his own words, it "blowed him up till he very nigh bust." ... Roger had swallowed at least a gallon of a liquid chemically designed, one might say, on purpose to utterly upset the internal economy. Harvest beer is probably the vilest drink in the world. The men say it is made by pouring muddy water into empty casks returned sour from use, and then brushing them round and round inside with a besom. This liquid leaves a stickiness on the tongue and a harsh feeling at the back of the mouth which soon turns to thirst, so that having once drunk a pint the drinker must go on drinking...

Jefferies continues in rather too much detail about the effect of this ale on Roger's digestion and constitution. But the point is clearly made, that, to cope with the unrelenting physical demands of the harvest, the reaper had to resort to a drink, both addictive and barely nourishing. He dismisses the alternatives which well-intentioned 'Just Stop Ale' campaigners made for Roger's improvement: weak tea, oatmeal-infusion, vinegar and water...

'The truth is the English farmer's man was and is, and will be, a drinker of beer... Those who wish really well to the labourer cannot do better than see that he really has beer to drink—real beer, genuine brew of malt and hops, a moderate quantity of which will supply force to his thews and sinews and will not intoxicate or injure.'

The sensible employer, supplying the labourers with genuine beer, Jefferies argues, would gain their goodwill as well. 'Roger the reaper' was paying a high price for cost-cutting.

The harvest of yesteryear depended mainly on manual work, skill and muscle-power in field and garden. Roger's harvest toil and pain are long past, mercifully: the clever combine has made him redundant. Where would he be working now? Very probably not in farming, with its much reduced, but more technological, workforce.

The varied and abundant produce in today's supermarket is possible because of mechanisation. But we might be surprised at how much human labour and certainly skill is still needed to give us the food choices we sometimes take for granted. Are we thankful enough?

And so, the vagaries of life in Binley go on. Who is up and who is down? Down most definitely are Kites. There are nothing like the numbers of previous years. Where have they gone? Surely there just wasn't the carrion for the numbers we had. Buzzards are up, creeping in as the opportunists they are. Hares have had a spectacular year and I couldn't be happier. Double figure numbers have been seen tearing around the Downs and young leverets are lolloping around the lanes and should be given time and space to make their escape. God only knows what has happened to our rabbits? I see more hares than rabbits these days. Twenty years has seen an almost total wipe out. The deer I have documented here enough. And I continue to see healthy numbers.

The last few days has seen monsoon rainfall. Driving home this evening I came across two partridges standing in the middle of the lane and soaked to the skin. You couldn't have seen two more miserable creatures. I got out of the car, and they were so inanimate that I was able to collect them up and pop them in a Waitrose hessian shopping bag. Using the car's heater and fluffing them up I was able to revive them to such a state of irritation with me that I had to sling them out the window where they took off like arrows. Sometimes I don't half feel good about myself! It's rare but it happens! **NA**



#### **Save our Chalk Streams**



Here in Hampshire, we have some of nature's greatest gems in the form of our local chalk streams. If you love exploring the outdoors, you've probably been treated to the idyllic scene they offer lush green plants drifting in

crystal clear water, the serenity broken only by the resident wildlife. Iconic species like the mayfly, kingfisher, and water vole all call these places home.

Chalk streams appear commonplace due to their prevalence in our region, but we're very lucky – only 210 exist worldwide, and 85% of those are in England. The reason for their rarity is also the source of their special qualities: fed by an underground chalk aquifer, their water is unusually cool, clear, and oxygenated. This makes them wonderful havens for nature.

Sadly, all is not well with these remarkable habitats. Many are failing their ecological health tests, and every single one is in the worst category for chemical standards. The causes are numerous, with over-abstraction and sewage pollution among them. What's more, the government's target for returning the streams to good health is now decades away, in 2063. When it comes to tackling these issues, legal designations like **Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI)** or **Special Area of Conservation (SAC)** can be somewhat helpful. Yet only a small number of England's chalk streams have such protections, and the existing framework is too narrow to fully address the impact of pressures like housebuilding and agriculture.

Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust has now launched a campaign to raise awareness about this pressing problem. 'Save our Chalk Streams' proposes bespoke legal protections for all chalk streams and greater investment into restoration projects, reduced abstraction, upgraded sewage treatment works, and an expanded system of monitoring and enforcement.

You can play a crucial role in the campaign by completing an e-action that asks your MP to push for change. Our chalk streams can't wait 40 years to be healthy, and we need your help – visit <a href="https://www.hiwwt.org.uk/rivers">www.hiwwt.org.uk/rivers</a>. #### What's happening in our skies?

The best place to visit to find out what's in the heavens is a website like the BBC's "Sky at Night" – you can find it by searching for Sky at Night at www.bbc.co.uk. The Milky Way should be easily visible as skies darken going into winter – if there's not too much light pollution! Images like the one above are easy to take if you have a digital camera and a tripod. If you come along to our meetings, you can also find out more about all things astronomical from our members who include both amateur and professional astronomers.

#### Christopher Taverner, St. Mary Bourne

On Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> August, Christopher died peacefully aged 86 in the Royal Hampshire County Hospital in Winchester after bravely battling a short illness. He and his wife Jennifer moved to the village in 2016, having previously been living in Grateley since 2011. He was a familiar face on 'the rec' and

around the lake, walking their dog, Ollie.

Christopher spent some of his childhood growing up in Hampshire in fact living in Weyhill House, Weyhill (now demolished) whilst his father Brigadier Roger Taverner was stationed in Tidworth, having previously been captured during the second world war and spending three years as a prisoner in the Stalag 2 war camp.

After leaving Bedford School as an accomplished rower and rugby player - over the years he captained both Blackheath and the New York City rugby clubs for brief spells - he maintained a great passion for these sports annually hosting friends at the Varsity match at Twickenham for many years and at the Henley Royal Regatta as a Leander Club member.

In his youth he served as a cadet and officer in the merchant navy travelling the world, spending time in India, Africa and Australia with the British Indian Steam Navigation Company, before a short spell as an officer within the British Navy.

He then started what would become a sixty year career in the world of drinks in 1962, firstly as regional sales manager for the North East of England with Guinness & Co, before re-locating with the business to New York City where he met his wife Jennifer, and amongst other 'celebrity' encounters as their key East Coast USA brand representative, he even managed to enjoy a memorable night in a bar drinking Guinness with Frank Sinatra and his entourage!

Returning to the UK, he spent four years as Sales Director at 'Rawlings of London' helping quickly build Mateus Rose to a half a million-case brand. He then moved with his wife and young family to Tokyo with 'Inchcape' as Director of their Wine & Spirits division distributing brands that included Pommery (& Greno) Champagne, Remy Martin Cognac, Gordon's Gin, Campari, and Black & White Whisky.

After a spell as MD of 'Goldwell UK & USA' and then as the USA and South America Director for Glenlivet whisky, in 1979 he joined 'Jenks Brothers' in the UK as Director of Beers, Wines & Spirits, where he supplied many of the major UK retailers, working closely with Weston's cider, Theakston's brewery and other own label beer brands. During his time there the Jenks Brothers notoriously turned down the opportunity to work with Jacobs Creek – citing there was never going to be any major interest in Australian wine!

Much of his working life was spent moving the family around the UK living in Berkshire but mainly Gloucestershire, regularly renovating and then moving house around the Cirencester area, although they also lived in North Berwick, Scotland for a short period — only a decent 5 iron across the fairway and onto the beach!

In 1996 he set up his own consultancy business and with a great passion for an industry he truly loved, he continued to work closely with numerous global contacts in the Beer, Wines & Spirits sectors until only recently, regularly travelling to the USA where for a few years he enjoyed a holiday home on the island of Sanibel in Florida. He often visited Burgundy over the years and enjoyed a brief period living in the Lot region of France whilst keeping a home in Battersea, London.

Many of his greatest friendships were made within his six decades working in the drinks industry and his friends and family will always remember his great passion and professional courtesy towards the industry, his zest for life, his positive and friendly demeanour, an appreciation of a fine whisky and above all his dedication to the family he loved. He will be missed. He is survived by his loving wife Jennifer, their two sons Ben and Charles and four grandchildren.

There will be a memorial service for Christopher at St Peter's Church, St Mary Bourne at 2pm on Thursday November 23rd.
