

Dear Friends,

What are you hoping for this Christmas? A nice present? Time with family and friends? Good food? World peace? At this time of year when the advent calendars are opening up each day there is a sense of anticipation, particularly among children! Remember back to your younger days when you knew Christmas was coming. For most of us we could hardly contain the excitement with the thought of new presents appearing soon. And not just presents, but the decorations, the Christmas tree, the food, the music, the parties, nativities, Christingle services, and everything else that happens in December!

As a child when I sat down for my Christmas dinner each year one of the things I particularly enjoyed was the Christmas cracker (not the sprouts!). Have you ever wondered why we have them? Apparently, they were first made in 1850 by a London sweet maker called Tom Smith. One night he was sitting in front of his fire watching it burn and listening to it crackle and he thought it would be fun if his sweets and toys could be opened with a crack when their wrappers were pulled in half. So, he turned this idea into reality.

And today's Christmas cracker has evolved from this and now includes three essential items: a hat, a joke, and a gift. Firstly, the hat isn't just a hat, it's a crown. Have you ever noticed that? The reason it's a crown is because at Christmas we remember and celebrate the birth of a king, Jesus. He is called Christ the King, and the King of kings.

Secondly, there's the joke. At one time crackers used to contain messages as well as jokes. They could be words of wisdom and advice (a bit like fortune cookies) and even Bible verses. Today though, crackers usually just have very bad jokes inside them. The truth is the real message of Christmas isn't a joke. It's a time when we also thank God for sending us his son to be our saviour.

And finally, there's the gift inside. Depending on how much we spend on crackers, it usually indicates the quality of the item in them (and sometimes the quality of the jokes!). They are usually cheap, made from plastic, and break after five minutes but give some amusement to children over the dinner table!

The real gift of Christmas, however, is greater than anything we can buy. The gift of Jesus and his promise of forgiveness, love, hope, and eternal life for those who believe in him is priceless. The Bible says:

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. John 3:16

So, why not celebrate the real reason for this season and enjoy some of the wonderful Christmas services coming up. Everyone is welcome.

Christmas Bins and Recycling

Basingstoke & Dean Waste Services will be altering their collection days during the festive period. Please remember that wrapping paper cannot be recycled and should be put into your normal black waste bin. For the first collection after Christmas ONLY they will collect additional waste as long as it is securely tied in a black rubbish bag and placed next to your black bin. Large pieces of cardboard can be left next to your recycling bin but it must be dry....

Bin collection dates will alter as follows:

- Friday 29th December will now be collected on Tuesday 2nd January
- Friday 5th January will now be collected on Monday 8th January
- For those with garden waste collections, please note that these will cease for two weeks over the Christmas period between 22nd December and 8th January.
- Christmas trees (as long as all the decorations have been removed) can be recycled in garden waste collections from 8th January, but 6' trees must be cut in half. Once again the tree collection point in Whitchurch Town Car Park will be running but only AFTER Tuesday 2nd January and before 28th January.

Mulled Wine Recipe for Christmas

Ingredients

- 750ml bottle of red wine
- 1 sliced clementine
- 1 Cinnamon Stick
- 1 Star Anise
- 3 Dried figs
- 4 Cloves
- 3 Black Peppercorns
- 50ml Brandy

Method

- STEP 1Pour the red wine into a large saucepan. Add the clementine, cinnamon stick, star anise, dried figs, cloves and black peppercorns. Heat very gently until simmering, then turn off the heat.
- **STEP 2**Fish out the whole spices and peppercorns with a spoon, then stir in the brandy. Ladle into mugs, or heatproof glasses to serve. You could drop in a slice of clementine to each.



A Family Christmas

Promoted as a 'family time'—though of course it is for everyone—our Christmas festivities often follow inherited ritual patterns we have learned in our families. Church perhaps, Christmas lunch with all the trimmings, the opening of presents stacked under the Christmas tree, the King's broadcast, the post-lunch sleep...

A family time? And what could bring family members together more than a wedding or baptism on Christmas day—or even a funeral? Not that they were frequent Christmas events according to the early church registers, but they did take place. For instance, Earle Wedge, son of George (a farmer) and Hannah, was baptised on 25 Dec 1823 at St James', Woodcott. Peter Light and Mary Glover celebrated their marriage on 25 Dec 1694 at St Andrew's, Hurstbourne Priors. William Munday married Mary Tempel on 25 Dec 1742 at St Nicholas', Longparish. On 25 Dec 1689, Elizabeth Philpot, wife of 'Georgius', was buried in St Mary Bourne churchyard.

A baptism fits the Christmas theme well: the birth of Mary's baby in Bethlehem. In those centuries, the occasional service was very much a local and family affair: no relatives travelling across the country to attend, arriving breathlessly two minutes after the service started. The baptism was also the official naming of the child and registration of the birth before state records began in 1837. 'You are to name him Jesus,' according to St Matthew.

A marriage also echoes part of the Christmas story. We think of Joseph and Mary and their delicate social position as 'betrothed' parents. Our modern wedding expectations and sometimes vast expense make it hard for us to imagine the plain, undemonstrative church marriages of the 17th or 18th centuries. Perhaps the words and actions of the service then could speak more clearly.

But a burial on Christmas day seems unthinkable. It is completely out of tune with the way we celebrate the feast: facing death on the day we celebrate the birth. The vicar or curate came on from celebrating one of the three Communion services of the year to be with the grieving family. Pall-bearers manoeuvred the coffin; ringers tolled the bell; the village sexton filled in the grave: the funeral was very much the village looking after its own. Our Christmas is jolly - Joy to the world! yet we know how heavily some among us are bearing the loss of one they love. Christmas can still have a serious edge.



perfectly manicured streetside hedge? Unfortunately, there are hedges which are sprawling into the road.

This creates several issues, mainly it pushes traffic (and pedestrians) more towards the middle of the road and with oncoming traffic, causes delays and near-misses (hopefully not worse!)

If these issues are reported to Highways, there is a risk that THEY will instruct their contractors to cut back the hedge, especially where the risk is significantly high.

However, please don't think that they are doing you a favour – they will then bill the homeowner for the services provided. We guess that this may not be at a favourable rate either; against that which might be achieved with a local provider.

Sorry to moan – but overgrown roadside hedges are the responsibility of the landowner and contribute to road traffic issues around the parish. Please take accountability for your property and the impact on others.





Postcard from Binley

Some friends in Stoke have reared a pea hen from an egg in their kitchen. It's now fully grown, honking everyone awake at 5.00 am and pebble dashing the marble worktops. So they are now potty training it. That's British eccentricity for you. But they are not alone? All along this valley animal lovers are rearing orphaned lambs, ducks, chickens, foxes etc. under their roofs.

It is one of the charming aspects of country life and commendable. Charlie Corbett wrote about a black faced Tup (ram) named McTavish that his grandfather kept in the hall of his home which terrorised visitors. When I was first courting my wife, I arrived at the house at Dunley and wandered in to find her beloved goat, Daisy sat on the sofa watching "Tom Jones at the London Palladium". So, it's not unusual.

Sharing your home with animals has always been a part of country life. Which dog lovers amongst us haven't woken to the sight of a Jack Russell's backside staring you in the face? I know I have. On one occasion, bleary eyed from sleep and in the dim light I mistook it for the wife winking at me. I won't be making that mistake again. But if we look at the ancient old cottages dotted about this valley in many instances all manner of creatures would have been present under those leaky thatched roofs, lying on beds of straw on beaten mud floors. A cow for milking, a pig for eating and assorted fowl, and all providing a little warmth for the wretched human inhabitants. One only has to read Dr Stevens book on St Mary Bourne to realise how pretty ghastly life was for the labouring classes and nothing like the sanitised Victorian illustrations from artists like Myles Birket Foster of idyllic country life.

As I wander around the living room of my cottage, I can see great iron hooks and rings hammered into beams from previous centuries and one can only speculate as to their uses. If you travel regularly up the M40 as I do you will pass a field of around a hundred white geese on your left just after Warwick Services with the sign "Geese Online". As there are only two of us here for Christmas this year, no doubt mournfully tugging on a cracker that will fail to detonate (not a euphemism) I have ordered one. Risky, as the last goose I acquired wasn't as tender as the wellies I was wearing when I acquired it. But we shall see!

Today (November 15th) I have enjoyed one of the finest walks in a long while. All under an azure sky I have followed the Bourne, that glorious stripling feeder of the Test and now in full flow from Hurstbourne Tarrant to St Mary Bourne. Autumn is at its fiery best and despite the shocking state of this world I doubt I could have felt more content if I tried. That's how much this place affects me. The War Memorial is festooned in red poppies as I press on and upwards to "The Hanging" at its northern point and from here I looked down the grassy slopes of our valley where once great village elms would have stood sentinel. Now no more. But even so, that cannot detract from the beauty of this place, the sheer majesty of the hills, the old, thatched cottages nestling below, the sturdy red bricked farms, the flints in the Norman tower and the flag of St George fluttering above.

What a very apt time to mark Remembrance because it is for this, the wonderful life we share here that those people we commemorate gave the ultimate sacrifice, the gratitude we owe them is unbounded.

Uganda, October 2023 **Tracev Christy**

On Sunday October 15th, I set off on what would turn out to be an adventure of a lifetime, one which I had been yearning to go on for a very long time. Having joined the teaching staff at St Mary Bourne School last year, I found myself with the opportunity to be part of a team from Whitchurch Deanery supported by Mityana Projects Trust, on their annual visit to Mityana. Amongst other duties, I was to spend two days at Makonzi School (linked with St Mary Bourne), teaching in classes and building relationships with staff.

Upon our arrival on the first day at Makonzi, I was greeted by Margret, the assistant head before heading over to meet Head Teacher Samuel waiting for us on the farm. Here, I was introduced to the goats and pigs, two of the many projects provided through our partnership with SMB. The pig project seeks to educate the children on how to care for the pigs. The school grows maize to feed the children and staff.

When the maize is harvested, the pigs eat the roughage. When a sow has a litter, children are invited to apply to be selected to receive a piglet to care for at home. When the piglet is mature, they can either breed or sell, sharing the income with the school.

After a tour of the school, the rest of the day was spent teaching. In P2, we read and acted out 'The Lion and The Mouse' with Margret interpreting - much to the amusement of all the children. Their enthusiasm and energy was contagious with guite a scramble from volunteers to be

During the lesson, Margret's baby daughter was carried in to her - preschool age children born to teachers come to the school each day; babies being cared for by older female students while they are in lessons and returned to mothers for feeding, and older children playing outside while lessons

With the older children in P7, I shared leaflets that had been written to promote St Mary Bourne by children in Year 6 before generating examples of what could be written about Makonzi. With Teacher Ronald's help with interpretation (the children's English was very good but they struggled with my accent and pronunciation), we were soon involved in a good discussion that provided a bank of areas that the children could write about in their leaflet.


A second day at Makonzi was spent singing nursery rhymes in Pussycat Class, comparing UK animals with those in Uganda in P4 and a PE lesson outside with P6, using the tennis balls we had taken over for the school - great fun!


As is customary, we were treated to a big lunch of Matoke (steamed green bananas), rice, Irish (boiled potatoes), pumpkin, pork, avocado, banana and pineapple with all the staff. Ugandans like to offer their welcome by providing food and can feel insulted if you do not eat what is offered. The teaching staff received their gifts of soap, scarves, ties, toothbrushes, pens, matches and many more bits we had collected before leaving the UK with delight.

WATERCRESS & WINTERBOURNES

Wintery Chalk Stream Walks



As the weather grows colder, it's easy to heed the call of the sofa cushions. But if you do venture out on a chilly day, our chalk streams are lovely places for a stroll. Even in the wintertime, these precious habitats are brimming with life and colour. For those places that have a winterbourne, regular rain could see their stream return

to the landscape after months of hiding below the ground.

Take a walk in the early morning for the chance to catch a veil of mist lifting from the stream's surface — a magical effect caused by water rising from the chalk aquifer and meeting the frigid air. This is the ideal time of day to see and hear birds like wrens, robins, goldcrests, and kingfishers. You might even glimpse bats darting by, heading home after a night of hunting insects.

Winter is also the perfect season to spot brown trout and Atlantic salmon engaging in their courtship rituals. If you're lucky, you could witness males getting into tiffs over potential partners. No fish in sight? Look for patches of paler gravel on the stream bed; these might be freshly made nests, or 'redds'. These nests are easily disturbed, so check the area if your dog is going for a paddle.

Along the water's edge, you may see clumps of watercress and water crowfoot. While they flower in the springtime, these plants give shelter to small fish during the colder months. Up on the stream banks, you might find the dry remains of umbellifers like hogweed and cow parsley. Though past their best for beauty, these plants have hollow stems that make great hibernation spaces for insects.

If the ground is wet or frosty, study it for signs of animals passing through. You might be surprised by what you find, from the cloven-hooved tracks of deer to the star-shaped prints of water voles. Get to know your local wildlife – the number of toes, length of stride, and pattern of movement are all key. Fox tracks, for instance, look like those of dogs but tend to be in a straighter line.

The Watercress and Winterbournes scheme stays busy over the winter months - our intrepid volunteers are out surveying fish redds and monitoring riverflies. For a good excuse to visit charming places at their most peaceful, become a volunteer by visiting www.hiwwt.org.uk/winterbournes. Our work is made possible by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Go Star Gazing in December and January

4 Dec - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation - Best time to view Mercury at it is at highest point on horizon in evening sky. Look for planet low in western sky after sunset.

12 Dec - New Moon - best time to observe galaxies& star clusters, no moonlight to interfere.

13-14 - Gemini's Meteor Shower - BEST SHOWER producing up to 120 MULTICOLOURED METEORS PER HOUR at its peak.

Nearly new moon means dark skies for excellent show. Best view dark location after midnight. Meteors radiate from constellation of Gemini but may appear anywhere in the sky.

21-22 Dec - Ursids Meteor Shower- minor shower - 5-10 meteors per hour. Waxing moon will block out most of meteors.

22 Dec - December Solstice - The South Pole of Earth will be tilted towards the Sun, which will have reached its southernmost position in sky & will be over Tropic of Cancer. First day of Winter (winter solstice) in Northern Hemisphere & first day of Summer (summer solstice) in Southern Hemisphere.

27 Dec- Full moon will be located on opposite side of Earth as Sun& its face will be fully illuminated. Known as Cold Moon by Native American Indian tribes.

2-4 Jan - Quadrantids Meteor Shower up to 40 meteors per hour at peak. Waning Moon will block faintest. Best view after midnight. Meteors radiate from constellation Boot but can appear anywhere in sky.

11 Jan - New moon located on same side of the Earth as Sun & will not be visible in night sky. Best time to view galaxies & star clusters.

12 Jan - Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation -Best time to view Mercury **it** will be at its highest point above the horizon in morning sky. Look for planet low in eastern sky just before sunrise.

25 Jan - Full Moon located on opposite side of Earth as Sun &its face will be fully illuminated. Known as Wolf Moon by early Native American tribes.

PLANNING

The Parish Council had NO OBJECTION to:

 Internal alterations at Smallwood Lodge, Longparish Road, Wherwell

The PC raised an **OBJECTION** for retrospective change of use to open-air storage on land forming **Harewood Industrial Estate**.

VILLAGE CLEAN UP DAY

The Parish Council is very grateful to organisers and volunteers who participated in the Autumn Village Clean-Up Day on 5th November postponed from the previous day due to the weather. Among the tasks carried out were clearance of the stream, litter picking, seeding along the Spinal Path, and removal of leaves. Volunteers enjoyed refreshments at The Cricketers Inn courtesy of the Parish Council. Special thanks to Jo Clare, Paul Knipe, and Jon Hopkinson, and to Collards for the use of a skip.

RESILIENCE PLAN

Test Valley Borough Council have hosted a number of Resilience Forums with the aim of inspiring communities to create their own Resilience Plan to identify potential risks such as flooding, fire, and extreme weather conditions, and the community members who are most vulnerable in these circumstances. A number of councillors have attended these forums, and it was agreed that the PC should form a Working Party of councillors and community representatives to prepare this useful document, which will focus on prevention and preparation.

HIGHWAYS

Road Repairs

Councillors discussed the recent road repairs, and the disappointment voiced by some residents that the work undertaken was not as expected. The original road closure was postponed due to bad weather, and when Highways operatives did return, only two small areas were patched. The Parish Council has been advised that large scale works are on ighways' list of planned works with a proposed date of mid-December, subject to weather conditions.

Bus Service

Unity is trying to determine the level of demand for a fully 'on demand transport service' for the community, using two 16-seat minibuses. Both minibuses would be fully wheelchair accessible. Any feedback received will be used to inform a Motability grant application which if successful will enable Unity to provide services to the rural residents in Test Valley.

LONGPARISH WILDLIFE AUTUMN WALK

Started from home as usual, down the back path, the usual bunch of noisy **House Sparrows** are on Arthur's feeders. Turning right at the shop, and a pair of **Collared Doves** are sitting on the wires. A small flock of **Starling**s are flying around. At the pony paddock are a lot of **Rooks** and **Jackdaws** and on the newly formed lake are some Mallards. Turning right into Mill Lane, a **Blackbird**, and a

Robin on the side of the road looking for food. On to Lower Mill bridge and I can see a **Heron** sitting on the little bridge going across to the island. Oh, and a **Cormorant** sat at the top of a tree with wings outstretched drying them properly after a



good feed. Turning left towards the ford and at the trout farm are **Greater Black-Backed Herring**, **Black Headed Gulls**, **Tufted Duck**, **Gadwall**, **Moorhen**, **Coot**, **Canadian Geese**, and a noisy **Carrion Crow**. Right onto the ford just a few more **Mallards**. Turn right into Nuns Walk and a **Red Kite** flies over and a **Hedge Sparro**w in the hedge. **Fieldfare!** That's the first of the winter for me and **Redwing** fly up from Owls Lodge side of the road.

On we go, great! a Tit flock; you never know what you may find in one of these, Long-Tailed, Great, Blue and a Coal Tit. I can also see a Goldcrest. Britain's smallest bird. Turning right into South Side Road and on the bridge, I can see a **Kingfisher** sat on a branch, now it's gone. Upriver is a **Little Egret** and five Little Grebes, that's the most I've seen here. On we go, turning right back into Mill Lane; a lot of **Woodpigeon**s are flying around. We stop to have another look over the lake and I can see Pied Wagtails and a few Meadow Pipits. Carrying on a small flock of **Goldfinches** are feeding on what's left of the thistle seed. Back to the bridge a Grev Wagtail and a pair of Swans appear from behind the trees. I like to sit here for a while. It's a good place to see birds and bingo! A **Sparrowhawk** comes flashing by. Just before Tudor Cottage a few **Chaffinches** are eating the Beech mast on the ground. Turn right and I can see a **Kestrel** hovering in the field behind the pony paddock and a cock **Pheasant.** On we go and a **Buzzard** is circling up high, calling. I can see a bird coming towards me quite high. Wait a moment, it's a **Peregrine Falcon**, what a bird to finish our walk on. I hope you enjoyed our little walk. We saw 41 different birds.





Book Review:

The Lemon Tree: An Arab, a Jew, and the Heart of the Middle East Sandy Tolan

In 1967, Bashir Al-Khayri, a Palestinian twenty-five-year-old, journeyed to Israel, with the goal of seeing the beloved old stone house, with the lemon tree behind it, that he and his family had fled in 1948, nineteen years earlier. To his surprise, when he found the house, he was greeted by Dalia



Ashkenazi Landau, a nineteen-year-old Israeli college student, whose family fled Europe for Israel following the Holocaust. On the stoop of their shared home, Dalia and Bashir began a rare friendship, forged in the aftermath of war, and tested over the next thirty-five years in ways that neither could imagine on that summer day in 1967. Based on extensive research, Sandy Tolan brings the Israeli-Palestinian conflict down to its most human level, suggesting that even amid the bleakest political realities there exist stories of hope and reconciliation.
