



The Rev Canon Dodie Marsden shares some thoughts about Wisdom from the Book of Proverbs

One of the books I studied at school was called "The Getting of Wisdom" by an Australian author, Henry Handel Richardson. This name was the pseudonym of Ethel Richardson, a writer who was born in 1870 to a reasonably well-off family which later fell on hard times. Because of their precarious finances, Ethel's family had to keep moving house and so she attended boarding school.

Her book is about a young girl called Laura who is imaginative, clever, and both proud and sensitive. Laura struggled with those more fortunate than her at school and suffered if any information about her family was discovered. She then faced ridicule and was scorned. But at the end of the book she undergoes a form of redemption when she finishes her final year and leaves – free at last from the constrictions of school, the expectations of teachers and the cruelty of her peers. Free at last to be herself and take her own path through life.

It was a seminal book for me. Not just because of the story but because of the references to the biblical Book of Proverbs; in particular Chapter 4: 7 *Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore, get wisdom: and with all thy getting get understanding.* (King James' version).

That verse has stayed with me all my life. I read it for the first time in a school assembly, feeling hopelessly bumbling and fearful. Thankfully, I didn't make a complete hash of it!

Over the years I have remembered those words and thought about the wisdom mentioned in the Book of Proverbs and what it really is.

"Wisdom", says the writer of Proverbs, "is like silver or hidden treasure". This brings to mind two connotations:

- Wisdom is extremely valuable. It is essential for making good decisions or knowing what to do in perplexing or puzzling situations. So, it is a treasure of inestimable value.
- 2. Like silver being mined or hidden treasure, wisdom doesn't reveal itself unless we search for it diligently. But it is worth the pursuit.

The Book of Proverbs then talks of a certain kind of wisdom. It may encompass common sense, scientific

knowledge and emotional intelligence, but it also has \underline{a} moral quality.

The author of Proverbs writing as a parent to an older child wants the best for him/her. And the wisdom spoken of here therefore involves what is right and just and fair. It talks about the pursuit of a 'good life' where compassion and kindness are by-words for lifestyle, and the wisdom spoken of is greater than mere human wisdom.

Then I found myself asking: "How do I do this? How do I gain such wisdom?"

The answer wasn't far away.

The author speaks about trusting the Lord and warns us to 'lean not on your own understanding.' If we trust in God 'He will make your paths straight'. The writer compares life with a journey; a path where its character, quality and destination are determined by the decisions and behaviour we adopt along the way. The wisdom of faith is a way, a direction of life, a following along the right path to keep us safe and from acting foolishly. A way to avoid becoming an unwise old fool!

But also in gaining wisdom, Proverbs invites us to look back and hold onto some traditions set by our forebears. And at the same time to look forward to care for the next generation. We are invited to think about the values of our tradition of faith. We are encouraged to draw on the work of those who have gone before us to help our young face the challenges ahead.

So, wisdom is the path. A path that has been made by others who lived before us. Our task is to learn it, walk it, and tell of it. The book of Proverbs tells us: the getting of 'Wisdom is the principle thing', and it reminds us that 'with all thy getting, get understanding.'

May you find the right path through difficulty and disappointment, through joy and celebration in 2024.



This role is a lot more than just attending the monthly PC meeting!

The Parish Council is grateful to Becky Hopkinson and Kim Lampard for their valuable contribution as councillors. Becky was elected in May, and was a valued member of the Open Spaces working party. Kim, a councillor for more than five years, was the driving force behind the new-look website, and skilfully steered the Parish Council through the acquisition of The Plough Inn for the community. Both will be very missed, and we wish them well.

We are also interested in hearing from anyone who would like help us to co-ordinate the Speed Indicator Device in the village.

Sewers and Drains

Christopher Duxbury, our village liaison with Southern Water, presented a report to the PC about the recent sewer issues caused by a fractured outflow pipe, and other issues exacerbated by recent bad weather. Christopher and others, maintained contact with Southern Water throughout, who, in turn, did an excellent job of keeping us informed and responding quickly to make a temporary repair. Plans are afoot for Southern Water to return in the spring once water levels have receded, to make a full repair, and survey other areas of pipeline. Wanted – Toad Patrollers 2024.

Help save amphibian lives in Longparish!



Each year frogs and toads make their annual migration back to the pond that they were born in to produce their own young. They will follow the simplest trajectory possible and, often, this means that they end up crawling straight across roads and are crushed by traffic. Frogs and toads are an essential part of the ecosystem and their survival is unfortunately being threatened due to so many deaths on the roads. One such area of concern is Nuns' Walk in Longparish. Our toad patrollers come out when conditions are dark and wet (and therefore suitable for toad movement) and help the creatures on their journey. Last year, our toad army not only saved 1171 lives but captured essential data for the wildlife conservation charity *Froglife*.

Full training is given, and there is a great deal of camaraderie and satisfaction involved in the job, not to mention the serious upping of your daily step-count! Children supervised by adults are welcome, and many intrepid young amphibian fans helped us last year.

LONGPARISH WILDLIFE



For all you lovely people who feed the birds please remember to keep your feeders clean. This week I saw a House Sparrow with Trichomoniasis which is a disease caused by a Protozoan Parasite. It's responsible for the rapid decline of the Greenfinch. The disease was first noted in 2006 it's also often called Canker. It has now spread to Chaffinches and House Sparrows. Trichomoniasis typically causes disease at the back of the throat and in the gullet. Affected birds show signs of general illness, lethargy, fluffed up plumage, and may show signs of difficulty swallowing, laboured breathing. This can also be accompanied with some wet plumage around the beak and drool saliva, or regurgitated food that they cannot swallow.

So, if you see a bird with these symptoms please clean your feeders and water as there is no cure.

Our curriculum is based at developing the children's roots. Just as trees with robust roots are more likely to withstand environmental challenges and flourish, children who receive a rich and nurturing early development are better



TOAD PATROL 2024



Every year, frogs and toads make their annual migration back to the pond where they were born to produce their own young. They follow the simplest trajectory possible and, often, this means that they end up crawling across roads and being crushed by traffic. Frogs and Toads are an essential part of our ecosystem and their survival is unfortunately threatened by so many deaths on the roads. One area of concern is Nun's Walk in Longparish. Our toad patrollers come out when conditions are dark and wet (and therefore suitable for toad movement) and help the creatures on their journey.

Last year, our toad army not only saved more than 2000 lives, but also captured essential data for the wildlife conservation charity Froglife.

Full training is given, and there is a great deal of camaraderie and satisfaction involved in the job, not to mention the serious upping of your daily stepcount! Children supervised by adults are welcome, and many intrepid young amphibian fans helped us last year. 





At the end of the December meeting Oliver Madge, chairman since May 2022, resigned and stood down with immediate effect, having given enormously generous use of his time and energy over that period to steer the Council back into safe waters after an unsettled phase. We should all be grateful for what he

has done, wish him well and hope that he might join us again when he feels he can spare more time. Patrick Foote, his former deputy has taken on the chairmanship until after the Annual Parish Meeting in May and the council will seek to co-opt a new member to fill this vacancy at the next meeting in February.

One parishioner has already put himself forward but if anyone else wishes to be considered for co-option please contact the parish clerk (clerk@stmarybourne-pc.gov.uk) as soon as possible so that eligibility can be confirmed in time for the meeting on 13th February.

High water levels and Sandbags:

Inevitably, with the current high levels of stream and ground water and the attendant drainage problems, council members and particularly the Flood and Emergency Group are in constant communication with Southern Water and the Environment Agency to try to prevent flooding in the vulnerable parts of the parish and tankering has recently been stepped up and is subject to continuous review as to positioning and intensity in both Stoke and St Mary Bourne. Group members can be contacted through **flood@stmarybourne.org** or via the clerk as above.

There is a recent posting on the Parish Council website (www.stmarybourne-pc.gov.uk) and noticeboard, and Bourne Valley Signpost and the Real Bourne Valley Signpost about sandbags and how to acquire them for those who may think this would prudent.

Bourne Valley resident wins Chalk Stream Conservation Award



Our congratulations to Sarah Cooney, one of the wonderful Watercress and Winterbournes scheme volunteers, on receiving the 2023 Vitacress Conservation Trust Award. This accolade is awarded annually to an organisation or individual that has done outstanding work to improve river habitats.

Sarah first became involved in chalk stream conservation in 2014. She has a stretch of the beautiful Bourne Rivulet running through her garden in Stoke and joined the St Mary Bourne Flood & Emergency Group after a major flood event. She then joined the Bourne Rivulet Initiative and volunteered with Natural Flood Management efforts in the area.

When Watercress and Winterbournes began its development phase in 2018, Sarah became a Chalk Stream Champion - a role to which she remains hugely dedicated. She now undertakes regular riverfly monitoring in the Bourne Rivulet and Upper Test, using both the ARMI and SmartRivers methods to gather crucial data on the health of these streams.

Sarah said of her achievement, "The journey has been amazing, and I have learned so much along the way. There are many riverfly volunteers out there month-on-month, in all weathers, poring over trays and looking down microscopes - and that sense of belonging to a broader team creates a motivating and inspirational volunteering experience."

February Freezer - A Hill & Valley Exclusive

Revd Henry White (1733-1788), youngest brother of Gilbert, celebrated author of *The Natural History of Selborne*, was rector of Fyfield (four miles west of Andover, nine west of Hurstbourne Priors) from 1759 until his death. Their father taught his family to observe the natural world and record in detail what they saw. Henry wrote his up into 'Logs', diary notes on his activities each day: work on his farm, the rectory garden, his visits and what he observed on the way, plus the daily weather report. We can look at his account of the weather on 1 February, transcribed from the surviving, unpublished 'Logs' from the 1780s. They give an idea (in 'old money') of what it might have been like in these parishes too:

Thursday, 1 Feb 1781: A very wet morn and Day until noon. Barometer 29 ⁷/₁₀; Wind SW to NW; Thermometer 50.

Friday, 1 Feb 1782: Hardest Frost this Year, & very white. Windows very much flowered; Perfectly Bright & calm Day, continued freezing in ye Shade; [...?], in S.W. Barometer 29 8/10 to 7/10; Wind N; Thermometer Mnt [midnight] 20—day 36—Night 27.

Saturday, 1 Feb 1783: White frost rather hard, bright clear Morn & Day; This thickens p.m.—Wind rises, dark cloudy Even, wind, & small misty Rain. Barometer 29. ³/₁₀; Thermometer 46; Wind W; Rain total in Jan^y 20 inches as nearly as can be gauged.


Sunday, 1 Feb 1784: Very bright clear Morn', & y^e. hardest frost this Winter excepting y^e. 31.st of Dec^r but quite calm, & still. Barometer 29 ⁷/₁₀ turned up to ⁹/₁₀ at p.m.; Thermometer 29.-35. Night 24. Wind N.

Tuesday, 1 Feb 1785: Frost hard, but not violent. — very bright clear Sunshine, & y^{e.} Wind quite calm, & still, — y^{e.} Ground rough & hard, & bad for riding; —keen Air in y^{e.} open Fields & frozen all Day in y^{e.} shade; —very bright Starlit Night. Barometer 29 ⁸/₁₀ to ⁹/₁₀ 1/₂; Thermometer mnt.28.—39. p.m.—Night 27. Wind N. to N.E. Rain

Friday, 1 Feb 1788: Smart Frost, dark, cloudy morning; very cold & raw air: light night hard frost. Barometer 29 $^5/_{10.}$ $^1/_{2}$; Thermometer 30-30-28. Wind N.E. Rain

Lowest temperature recorded, 20 (-6.7C); highest, 50 (10C): five of the six years frosty...

Some of us will remember with a shiver the beautiful flowery effect of frosted condensation on the inside of windows. How will 1 February this year compare? *MC*

Remembering...

Peter Keeling

10th September 1927 - 3rd November 2023

Peter was born on 10th September 1927, one of eight children of Harry and Grace. He had five brothers: Leslie, Albert, Francis (Frank), Jacob (Cyril), Leonard (Luvvie) and two sisters: Mary (Poppy) and Pamela.

The Keeling family can be traced back to 1745, most of whom were born and lived in St Mary Bourne and Ashmansworth. Peter, like his siblings, went to St Mary Bourne primary school. He left school at an early age and worked for Mr Culley as a farm hand before leaving home around the age of 16 to join the army.



He joined the British Army of the Rhine. He served with the battalion of the Black Watch in 1942 during World War II and was stationed in Germany. Towards the end of the war, he was a guard for the last prisoner Rudolf Hess at Spandau Prison. Peter continued his education whilst in the army passing all subjects in 1951.

He met his future wife, Dorothy who was also in the army working in the NAAFI. They

got married on 8th February 1950 in Barking, London whilst Peter was on leave.

In 1952, they had a daughter, Susan, in Hamburg. After he left the army, the family returned to England and eventually moved to Fosbury where Peter took up a gardening job. Later on, he got a job as a gardener for Lord and Lady Rochford in Binley. During this time Peter won many prizes in the local flower show and won the Fuller cup in 1957 for all-round best entrants in the show.

The family got a council house at Stoke where they lived for many years. Peter then started work at Portals Paper Mill during which time he was diagnosed with blood cancer. Oncologists told him nothing could be done, but with the intervention of Mr Russell whom Peter used to work for as a part time gardener, Peter received treatment that cured him. Although he had his spleen removed, Peter did not take medication and continued to have a normal, healthy life. During this illness, Peter and Dorothy moved to a bungalow in Stevens Green, St Mary Bourne where they found life easier and soon settled in to the village.

Peter and Dorothy liked to go to the Hurdlers Arms in Binley, the Bourne Valley Inn and the George Inn in St Mary Bourne where they made many friends. They particularly enjoyed many a merry night at the Hurdlers Arms especially when there was a lock-in with other regulars.

In his later years, Peter took up beating for Wyndham Culley. When Dorothy died in 1998 at the age of 75, Peter continued to live in the bungalow. Over time he became a close companion with his neighbour Joan Goodyear. They used to go for long walks round the village together with her beloved dog Bobby. Sadly, when Joan died, Peter became unwell and developed dementia. He spent the last four years of his life in the Arbory Care Home where he passed away.

Peter had a good sense of humour. Having left home and joined the army at a young age, he was very self–reliant. He was stubborn and knew his own mind. Notably he didn't carry any truck with doctors or other professionals. When he became really frail, his daughter arranged for him to receive meals at home but Peter point-blankly refused. Nevertheless, Peter was always in good cheer and never complained about his own situation.

Peter leaves behind his only daughter, Susan and his grandchildren Samantha and Richard and a great grandson, Arlo.

Norman Bunce

9th June 1934 - 6th December 2023

Norman was born in St. Mary Bourne in 1934 to parents Harry and May. Norman was the middle of three boys, Den being the eldest and Ron the youngest.

He had a carefree childhood roaming the countryside with family dog Laddie, tickling trout in the river, ferreting for rabbits, and helping out at Breach Farm. A Sunday walk to Link to visit his grandparents was a regular thing.

He attended St Mary Bourne and Whitchurch schools but didn't like school much and on leaving, he started work as a trainee plumber for Freddie Taylor at Link. After learning his trade, he spent several years working on the Upper Drove Estate in Andover for the developer Charlie Bowyer.

When the estate was finished, Norman decided to branch out on his own. His brothers, Basil Willis, Tommy Gibbons and himself formed the nucleus of a building firm and other men were taken on as the years went on.

At about this time, he met Kay at a dance in Southampton. They married in 1963 having bought and renovated a house at Riverside. Two children, Susan and David, were born. Family holidays were spent mainly in a caravan and later in a cottage in The New Forest.

The business thrived. Norman was happy in his work and prided himself that he carried out his jobs to a high standard. Riverside was sold and Brookside, opposite the church, was built.



Norman retired at the age of 61 and wanting something to keep himself busy, he suggested to Kay that they buy The Firs, Picket Piece as it needed complete renovation and had two acres of land. After getting things straight at The Firs, Kay and Norman decided to travel, making trips to Australia, New Zealand, Kenya, America and Canada.

A motorhome was purchased and trips were made around the UK and Europe. Friendships were made and regular meetings at various camp sites around the UK kept the friendships going. By this time, two grandchildren Joe and Amy had arrived and were a great joy. Norman loved being a grandad and watching the children grow up.

After 18 years at Picket Piece, they agreed that the upkeep of the garden was getting too much, so the house was sold and the move to Longparish made. The move was not regretted. The neighbours were very welcoming, the house and garden were enough to keep Norman busy and there were coffee mornings, garden club and village lunches to attend.

All was well until February 2022 when bone cancer was diagnosed. Norman gradually slowed down and got more tired and frustrated at not being able to do the things he had been accustomed to. The motorhome was sold and a mobility scooter and two walking sticks were obtained. There were still trips on fine days to The Cleeves, with Kay on her electric bike and Norman on his scooter which were greatly enjoyed and Norman still tried to get in a short daily walk when he could.

Medication kept the pain at bay and with the help of carers from the Hospice in Andover during the last few weeks, Norman was able to stay at home and passed away peacefully on December 6th.
