

## Hill & Valley

Mary Jo Darrah and Graham are shortly to leave Longparish after 63 years. We asked Mary Jo to write her reflections on the development of our magazine. We are truly grateful for her leadership, diligence and inspiration in bringing Hill & Valley to its current much respected status. Michael Widén and Tom Bremridge, Editors

The first issue of Hill & Valley appeared in January 2000. Until 1993 Longparish, like most villages had a church Parish Magazine for subscribers which was a diocesan publication including a section relating to the local church, St Nicholas. When Rev. Bill Robson became Rector in 1993 and Longparish was linked with the churches in Barton Stacey and Bullington as well as Hurstbourne Priors he was keen to bring the villages closer and with the support of the Parish Councils started *The Parish News* which was partly financed by advertising and included news of all village activities including Parish Council reports. As Chairman of Longparish Parish Council from 1983 I had produced occasional newsletters about the Parish Council which were delivered to all houses. The Parish News was delivered free to every household by volunteers. After Bill Robson left the village in May 1998 there was another reorganization of the benefice and after an interregnum Longparish and Hurstbourne Priors joined St Mary Bourne and Woodcott under the leadership of Rev. Martin Coppen at Easter 1999.

St Mary Bourne had a well-established Parish Magazine with subscribers, a system it did not initially want to change, but the Longparish and Hurstbourne Parish Councils (PCs) valued the ability to reach every household and agreed to subsidise the new magazine which was called Hill & Valley. Jeremy Barber, then chair of Longparish PC, was extremely supportive of the project through the first months and was foundational in steering it towards the success it eventually enjoyed. St Mary Bourne PC adopted the principle of free distribution by 2002. The system Martin set up with an organizing committee, representative of each of the PCs and parochial church councils, and local editors who produce copy for their own villages has worked well and spread the load. Initially Charles Cardiff edited Hurstbourne pages, Jane Snow St Mary Bourne and I Longparish, with Peter Hartland of St Mary Bourne preparing the complete final draft for the printer. Michael Widén with Ruth soon became a key co-ordinator dealing with the back page, the final edit, liaising with the printer, and distributors. Marion Collins who had organised the advertising for The Parish News continued until 2007 when her husband, John, took over until June 2017. In Longparish David Gould and Jeremy Barber made our pages available on the village website. Developing IT and printing technology have made the magazine increasingly professional and now in full colour. Over the last 24 years many people have generously given their time to make it happen.

### Vicar's Letter - March 2024

When is the best time of year to run a marathon? During Lent. That's when you fast!

It always surprises me how quickly time flies the older I get! What happened to January and February? We are well into the season of Lent now and Easter is rapidly approaching. I wonder if you have been doing anything for Lent this year? Many who observe it often choose to give something up like chocolate, or alcohol, or caffeine. Others choose to give up watching TV or social media and use the time to focus on reading the Bible and prayer, or spend more time with family and friends.

Lent comes from an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is in spring, when the days begin to get longer or lengthen. It's believed the Church has kept a period of fasting in the weeks before Easter for at least the last 1,500 years. This fast reminds Christians that they are dependent upon God for everything, just as Jesus was when he spent those 40 days in the wilderness being tempted. Hopefully those spiritual disciplines of fasting, prayer, reading the Bible, self-denial, giving to help those in need, self-examination, and penitence draws Christians closer to God and prepares them for the great celebration of Easter.

I'm aware that it's sometimes easy to give something up, like chocolate, for Lent but in the busyness of life to not actually go deeper and examine our own lives in order to bring about some personal change that will benefit us and others. It is also an important time for Christians to draw closer to God through repentance as they do at the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday and throughout those 40 days, remembering all that Jesus has done for them.

I encourage you then, to use the remaining time of Lent to think about your own lives; your hopes and dreams, the person you have become, and the person you would like to be. Why not make one change to your life to become that better person, or to draw closer to God.

You are very welcome to join us for our Holy Week and Easter services in our churches. We look forward to seeing you soon.

And finally, someone asked me if I had given anything up for Lent this year. I said yes, procrastination. I'm working on it!



## An invitation to take a trip along the B3048, Highway to the North

The *Roader's Digest* describes the road as 'an unofficial Andover eastern bypass'. Perhaps, but if anyone thinks they can drive from the A303 to the A343 in ten minutes, they are deluded. The B3048 follows a winding and indirect path through Longparish, Hurstbourne Priors, St Mary Bourne and Stoke. But then it was not designed as a bypass, it just came to be, probably to connect the wealthy Wherwell Abbey nunnery (986-1539) with its local estates. The Abbey farmed Forton, Gavelacre, Middleton, East Aston - i.e. most of Longparish - plus Wyke in St Mary Bourne. Now Wherwell Priory, more recently two noteworthy characters have lived there, who have both left their mark on the wider area.

Lt. Col. William Iremonger lived with his family in the Priory from 1811 until his death in 1852. His legacy is the tall Deadman's Plack cross (1825) in Harewood Forest (SU 40097 44818). It commemorates the legendary killing (c.963) of his courtier, Æthelwald, by King Edgar, contrition for which led Ælfthryth (at different times, wife to both) to found the nunnery.

Contributing rather more to the common good was Marjorie Pratt, Countess of Brecknock, DBE JP CStJ, Superintendent-in-Charge St John's Ambulance Brigade, who lived at Wherwell Priory until her death in 1989. She founded Andover hospice, The Countess of Brecknock House, which opened in 1990, recently enlarged and refurbished.

Our journey starts outside the attractive 'Rose' (actually 'Shepherd's') Cottage, Wherwell, at the junction of Winchester Road (B3420) and the B3048, which begins here. Why the B3048? It comes from the national classification of primary (A) and secondary (B) roads in 1923. The Ministry of Transport map of that year shows that, initially, it was only the section from Wherwell to Hurstbourne Priors. The northern stretch, linking the two Hurstbournes, was unclassified, but it was added in 1935 to make the 11.1 mile long B3048 we know.

A channel of the River Test runs on the other side of the road. Silver rivers, water meadows and farms feature throughout the length of this valley road. Up on the left is the dismantled track of the Fullerton Junction to Hurstbourne railway line, which runs alongside the road to the A303. Wherwell Primary School is on the right, the first of five schools (in 1935) - Hurstbourne Priors County Primary closed in 1969, leaving four flourishing now. There is also the first of the five cricket pitches.

A mile along the road, just before the houses, Harewood Forest looms on the left, its straight edge at right-angles to the road, marking the course of Roman Road 43, Chichester to Wanborough, near Swindon. A further fifth of a mile, in a dip with a steep railway embankment on the left, a scrubby roadside copse on the right, is the unmarked Longparish border. Without fanfare we enter *Hill & Valley* territory!



### **Postcard from Binley**

Jonathan Foster is thatching at the house. He's been here three weeks now and things are coming on well. I've known Jon since he was in short trousers and his father John as well, a true countryman, a man of few words and one of the nicest people you could ever meet. Jonathan on the other hand is a man of many words and I have been well and truly educated about straw. Straw I always thought in my ignorance was exactly that... straw. But no, you have Combed Wheat straw, Long straw, Water reed straw, with evocative names like "Red Standard", "Maris Huntsman", "Maris Widgeon", "Square heads Master", "Little Joss" etc and some are waxy, or brittle or stiff or bendy. The straw Jonathan is using on our roof goes by the unglamorous name of N59. As I look out of the window now, he is whittling away at some hazel sticks making his own spars.

Jonathan has an encyclopedic knowledge of old buildings, and it has been fascinating passing the time of day discussing a subject that interests me greatly. At one point, digging deep into the rotten old straw he removed a clump with dark discolouration that he told me would have been a part of the original roof when there was no second floor, no chimneys and a fire would have been lit in the middle of the mud floor which would permeate up into the thatch above and out through the glassless shuttered windows. The straw would become smoke damaged and discoloured. Many of what look now like chocolate box cottages here in the valley would at one time have been nothing more than damp miserable hovels, and I can recall many years ago when I had to re-lay the old brick floor in the sitting room a large black patch scorched into the mud where the original old fires would have been lit.

The oak and the hazel woods are beautiful throughout the year, whether bathed in winter sunlight or the lush green of high summer, but a winter oak under a cloudless winter sky is guite a thing to behold. And I have my favourites here in Binley - walking past them is comforting and reassuring and I like to give them a passing pat. Funny how trees can become so important in your life, I barely gave them a thought in my youth, but I even have favourite dead ones now. One sits in the middle of a hedgerow as you come over Cold Harbour farm looking toward Egbury. The sun rises behind it and there is invariably a kite or buzzard sat at the top of it. Most often it's a majestic sight and if you get your timing right almost biblical. It's a stunner. Another favourite is in Stoke on your left as you head out toward HBT. On a grey stormy day and full of crows, their beaks turned to the distant hill line, it's bleak and mournful and I love it.

I have been trying to research the existence in these parts of no less a bird than the great black woodpecker. My father-in-law mentioned this creature to me a long while ago but just recently browsing through an old book by George Dewar, "Wildlife in the Hampshire Highlands" first published in 1899, I find it mentioned again. It is said to possess habits resembling those of the Yappingale (green woodpecker) but with coal black plumage relieved by a little red. If anyone can enlighten me do get in touch.

Lastly, if you read the small print at the back of this magazine you will see Nigel Dickinson is the Parish Editor for St Mary Bourne and it's he who must make sense of this nonsense. Without wishing to come across as a brownnosed toady I have always liked Nige'. I first met him and Harriet some thirty-seven years ago in the Hurdlers Arms where one met all the best people. I remember Billy Ponting

who had the fishing on the lake at the time invited us down to fish and we spent a very pleasant afternoon down there before they invited me back to their cottage in Baptist Hill for supper. We were joined by my neighbours, the Widéns and I thought I'd died and gone to Bohemian Heaven. Nigel as you know was for many years the church organist and he and Harriet, a matriarchal figure in this valley have done so much for music and the arts here and continue to do so. I sincerely hope they raise our cultural standards for many years to come.

## William (Bill) Percy Vertel Read 26th June 1938 – 28th December 2023

Bill was born on 26<sup>th</sup> June 1938 and lived at Upper Wyke Farm with his parents Percy and Freda until he was 10 years old. Getting labour was difficult so his parents gave up the farm and bought Lower Wyke Down.

Bill went to school at Rookwood and then to West Holme School in Andover. He often played truant! When he left school he helped his father doing contract work. They also sold petrol and Calor Gas as well as keeping a few cattle.

In April 1976 a phone call was made to Bill from Mary at Ashley Warren asking him if he would like 2 orphan lambs. When he collected them, Mary said to Bill "See you next year". Bill's reply was "well, let's not leave it till

next year. Perhaps we can go for a drink?" To which Mary said "yes please".

In September Mary received the call from Bill asking her for a drink and to bring some wellies because he was going to look at a caravan in Hayling Island. Mary didn't drink so her sister Lydia suggested that she should ask for a Dubonnet and Lemonade. A pub was stopped at on the way there

Dubonnet and Lemonade. A pub was stopped at on the way there and on the way back! So a romance began.

Bill and Mary were married in 1978 and together with their son Peter worked to develop the caravan park and to obtain a licence to open the Wyke Down Public House which successfully ran with the caravan park.

In 2003 Bill and Mary decided to retire and bought a bungalow along the Ox Drove and Peter moved into Wyke Down to manage the pub and caravan park. Bill and Mary enjoyed being retired and they travelled to New Zealand to see their nephew and spent a month in Canada. More recently they enjoyed a cruise to Norway.

Unfortunately, Bill was diagnosed with delusion dementia and his memory deteriorated, but he was still active and enjoyed playing bowls and attending the Kingfisher Centre at Freefolk. He also enjoyed going down to the farm and going to Salisbury market with Peter.

Bill was admitted to Winchester Hospital before Christmas with different problems and he passed away on 28<sup>th</sup> December.

### Remembering...

### **Michael Jonathan Crofts**

22<sup>nd</sup> March 1959 – 20<sup>th</sup> December 2023

Mike was the second child of Jean and Fred Crofts and had one older sister, Gill. He never corrected the assumption that he was a true Yorkshireman, but in fact he was born in North Hykeham, Lincolnshire. The family moved to Bradford, Yorkshire in 1962 where Mike finally began to talk, and his life took root and flourished. Most definitely Yorkshire bred!

Throughout his schooldays Mike's enthusiasm and outgoing personality found him playing the timpani in the school band (winning a national competition and going on a European tour), performing in and producing plays and editing the school magazine. Aged 8 he joined a local cub pack starting a lifelong commitment to the Scout movement (a highlight being the World Jamboree in 1975 in Iceland and Norway), which provided a perfect outlet for his sense of adventure and fun and many enduring friendships.

In 1976 Mike discovered the joy of speed when he passed his driving test. Not content with just going fast on land, he joined Halifax Canoe Club to test his speeding skills in white water (the club won the Yorkshire Championship in 1981). Training included competitive drinking, fiery curry eating and dealing with troublemakers in the curry house and "The Queen" pub where he worked at weekends. He later added scuba diving, skiing and fast motorbike riding to his repertoire of thrilling hobbies.

On leaving school in 1977 Mike went straight into a job in insurance leading to a 41-year career providing insurance to the British military, including a ten-year period from 1983 to 1993 living near Osnabruck and serving British forces in Germany. Mike believed it was important not to just sell policies but to provide a full service helping to expedite claims and reassure claimants and their families. He always appreciated the way the military treated him (described as being the most wannabe soldier!) and was humbled to be made an honorary member of the Officers' Mess of the Adjutant General's Corps in March 2019. Just before he died, he learnt that the Corps had further honoured him by naming a trophy for the best all round performer at their annual ski championship after him. At the thanksgiving service in St Peter's a heartfelt tribute to Mike was given by Lt Col (Retd) Mick Cotton MBE, someone Mike had been pleased to know as a good friend since 1982, and as Mike had hoped, two buglers played the Last Post & Reveille.

Mike met Karen on a group skiing trip in 1989 and so began a long friendship which, when they both found themselves single in 1998, evolved into them giving into what their friends saw as the inevitable by becoming a couple. They were married in an art gallery in Bradford in September 1999.

April 2000 saw the great move South from Yorkshire to 1 Homefield, St Mary Bourne (followed in 2011 by a much shorter 100m move to Wendover House). Merlin the dog

was added to the family and in September 2001 their son Sam was born. Ruby completed the family when she arrived in March 2004.

Mike and Karen really appreciated the warm welcome they received and immediately got stuck into village life. Having won a prize at the Flower Show for his courgettes, Mike was surprised to find himself chairing the committee and hosting judges' lunches, which he managed to bluff his way through! His fund-raising skills were harnessed to good effect for the multi-use games area in 2004 and he subsequently organised a series of rugby dinners, auctions of promises, bonfire evenings and other events. He participated in village drama productions and loved how sociable St Mary Bourne is. Nothing made him happier than getting people together to have a good time and if it involved music, dancing and raising money for a good cause it was even better. In 2022 he put his fundraising skills to good use again helping to raise £250,000 in just a few months for the Boundary shop and café extension.



Mike thoroughly enjoyed volunteering in the village shop and delivering orders to those who were isolating or housebound during the Covid lockdown. He also helped out with driving for the neighbour care scheme. He was a big man with a big kind heart, always ready to chat and help anyone out and a thoughtful and loyal friend.

More than anything Mike loved people, meeting them, learning about them and keeping in touch. If he had your number

he would be likely to turn up on the doorstep, even if you were on another continent. He felt privileged to be part of a great group of close friends formed in St Mary Bourne who enjoyed many ski-trips, nights out and celebrations together. He had many other friends in this country and worldwide, particularly in Louisiana, some of whom he first met in 1995 on a dive trip to the Red Sea.

Mike's diagnosis of leukaemia and lymphoma in March 2023 was a shock to many and, despite the treatment putting the leukaemia into remission, the lymphoma proved resistant. He was glad to have the opportunity to tell so many people how much they meant to him and bore his diagnosis and treatment with typical Yorkshire grit, good humour and understatement. It was a great joy to Mike to live in such a special village and a comfort that his family would continue to have the support of such a marvellous community. Mike thought Karen's epitaph should be "her gravy wasn't bad" and said that he would like his own to be "Mike Crofts – he was something in this village".

Karen, Ruby and Sam would like to thank all those who have been such a support to the family over the last year. It is very much appreciated and has made an incredibly difficult time easier to bear.



Longparish Wildlife Stoats



A lot of people have never seen a stoat or have only had a brief glimpse as one runs across the road or footpath. Stoats have a long thin body with a tail that ends in a black bushy tip. Their fur is sandy-chestnut with creamy white underneath. They are small 30-40 cm long and weigh about 200 - 400 grams. It is thought the black tip is to distract birds of prey. Some stoats turn partially white in winter which is called Ermine Blue. This colour variant usually occurs up north so they can blend in with the snow. Stoats have a reputation of dancing in a bid to mesmerise rabbits, they have been observed leaping and thrashing around in a motion that seems to hypnotise their prey. Rabbits are a stoat's favourite food even though they can be five times their own size. Stoats will also take voles, mice, rats, as well as birds and even their eggs. They are energetic hunters, stoats will pursue their prey underground and up trees. Stoats are solitary for most of the year only coming together to breed. A litter of 6 to 12 young, known as kits are born in spring. The female will care for the kits for around 12 weeks after giving birth. They have a process known as delayed implantation which means the young are not born until next spring.

### Sustainable Living

This decade of human history is vastly different from those that came before. We have endured a global pandemic, the change in our country after leaving the EU, global supply chain disruptions, and now food scarcity is causing prices to rise. What does our food future look like? During the past conflicts we saw a rise in Victory Gardens. These gardens helped the war effort, removed some pressure off the supply chain, and ensured a family had food. During the Covid-19 pandemic the world saw an increase in small home gardens, as people had the time in lockdown to tend to them. It is a good time to consider that garden once again.

There are many low maintenance, high reward plants to grow. They can grow in the ground or in containers and do not require a greenhouse. Consider growing: cherry tomatoes, courgettes, potatoes, carrots, radish, parsnips, mint, and chives. If you have the space, beans and cucumbers, typically climbers, are also a good idea. With a little planning you could easily grow these, they generally don't have major

pest issues, apart from the occasional slug. Don't deter hedgehogs in your garden as these little omnivores love to eat

worms, beetles, caterpillars
and even slugs!







If you don't have the mobility or the outside space, you could consider a window garden. All you need is a window that faces south or west, with a few pots, soil and seeds you could have a cute little garden year-round. Just about anything with a shallow root system could be grown inside. For this, herbs, lettuce, green onions, hot peppers, spinach, baby beets, radish, and even edible flowers are good choices.

### **Toad Facts**

- Toads don't live in lakes and ponds. They live in gardens, rough grassland, hedgerows and woodland.
- In the UK, each year in February and March toads make the journey back to the ponds and lakes in which they were born to mate and produce their own young.
- The Nuns' Walk site is one of the biggest road sites in the UK with over 4 different migrations of toads going to different ponds and lakes.
- It gets VERY confusing knowing which toads are going where so our patrollers are all fully trained in differentiating the various migrations. Even then, mistakes still happen and a toad taken to the wrong patch of water will turn straight around and walk away!

Male toads start the season off with females

joining later. The boys are smaller and have a cute mating call. The ladies have bellies full of eggs waiting to be fertilised and can be quite large.



 Male and female toads often 'hook up' along the way (and in our buckets!). The male will climb onto a pregnant female's back and she will carry him to their mating destination.





### TOAD PATROL 2024

very year, frogs and toads make their annual migration back to the pond where they were born ✓ to produce their own young. They follow the simplest trajectory possible and, often, this means that they end up crawling across roads and being crushed by traffic. Frogs and Toads are an essential part of our ecosystem and their survival is unfortunately threatened by so many deaths on the roads. One area of concern is Nun's Walk in Longparish. Our toad patrollers come out when conditions are dark and wet (and therefore suitable for toad movement) and help the creatures on their journey.

Last year, our toad army not only saved more than 2000 lives, but also captured essential data for the wildlife conservation charity Froglife. Full training is given, and there is a great deal of camaraderie and satisfaction involved in the job, not to mention the serious upping of your daily step-count! Children supervised by adults are welcome, and many intrepid young amphibian fans helped us last year. ### IN MEMORIAM

On December 3<sup>rd</sup> 2023, thirty years to the day since she first moved to Hurstbourne Priors, Josephine Hutchinson died at Andover Nursing Home after a short illness. Josephine was a wonderful friend and neighbour to many in the village and is greatly missed; our love and thoughts are with Russell, Joseph, and all her family. The following is a letter from Josephine, written in her own inimitable style, and read by Ann Ball at her funeral.

h, my darling family and friends. If Ann is reading this, I must be dead at the moment! It might seem strange to say this, but I know how lucky I have been. In amongst some spectacular disasters and miseries (nay, even the odd drama), I have found out how loved I am. Not many people can be the centre of attention to the extent I have been, surrounded by such love and care. And I have relished and appreciated everyone's kindness.

From frustrated actress to a true Drama Queen: nobody does it better! But I had dreams and ambitions, as we all do. I was going to be a dancer, an entertainer – I was going to be famous. The only *minor* things that got in my way were the complete inability to remember any script and crippling stage fright! So, being a pragmatist, I chose the only Drama School to offer a Speech Therapy course, and ever since, I have basked in the reflected glory of "I trained with X and Y, you know ..."

On that note, throughout my adult life, at the end of every training session or presentation I have delivered, or even just a casual

interaction, there have come, unwavering, the words: "Has anyone ever told you, you're just like Dawn French?" I taught her everything, you know. But how I went from a nervous, newly qualified Speech Therapist to a hospital manager, I'm not quite sure. And, given that I was in Remedial Arithmetic at school, whoever thought giving me a 10 million pound budget was a good idea *must* have been bonkers. (Which reminds me: please spare a thought for Amazon and eBay. As a consequence of my demise, it is quite likely that they will both go out of business.)

No-one is perfect – and I am very close to being at the top of the list of imperfect beings. I wasn't the best Speech and Language Therapist, or hospital manager or any of the other jobs I did. What I did have was an instinctive understanding of people, particularly children. And that seems to be what people remember me for. Oh! ... and my sense of humour ... and my total inability to

under-cater ... and my compulsive wine-buying. And no, I haven't died of liver cancer because I was a lush – but by God I tried!

Rather than go on (I do rather hope that someone else might offer a fitting and glorious tribute to my fabulousness and many tremendous achievements), I would just like to express my gratitude to all of you for being in my life. I have been enriched by my loving family, my dearest school friends, my incredible neighbours (Fenella and many others), a wide, fabulous assortment of work colleagues, much-loved college friends, the fiercely loyal and protective Luxembourg contingent, and by anyone who doesn't fit into one of these groups but has become cherished and dear to me.

Thank you all for putting up with the swearing (a sign of my huge intelligence), the awful puns, the moods and occasional temper and the unexpected intolerance of something completely petty. Thank you for the laughs, the inebriated evenings, for listening to me at my lowest

ebbs, building me back up from the awful bottomless pit, when I thought I couldn't go on. Just as my life was at its very best, I get cancer. Well, bugger.

Some special mentions: Ann, for reading this and so, so much more; Tom and David, for being fabulous friends and neighbours; my sister, Claire, who I love and adore (sorry I pipped you to the post!); all my cousins, nieces and nephews; Mary, my best bosom buddy; and Katie and Katy (you know why). An extraordinary mention to Helen and Gary – I can't even begin to put *that* into words! And a special mention to Iain, who is not my stepson, but I feel like he is. Thank you for

keeping me close and making me very much part of your family

And most of all to you, my darling, darling boys. I truly cannot possibly express how much I love you. I have been the most blessed mother ever, and I thank God for bringing you to me. I wasn't the best parent, but I hope that I got better and that you have always, always known how much I love you. I am *so* proud of you both – and how you have overcome the difficulties you have faced. I promise to watch over you, so look out for the robins, the white feathers and other odd phenomena. It's me, still loving you, and Priya and Katerina.

Enjoy this service. I want laughter, tears and lots of love. It is my best production yet (and I haven't even mentioned chutney, jam or marmalade. Denise, forgive me for leaving you – we were a great team). Finally, as I may have said on more than one occasion, perhaps after a small, sweet sherry or several (!) ... I bloody love you, I do!!!!
