Dear Friends,

This May edition of the parish magazine comes on the back of Easter joy and the hope of new life found in the risen Christ. As trees, plants and flowers have been waking up in spring, now with warmer and longer days, we anticipate summer coming and enjoying the surrounding countryside and garden spaces that God has given us to nurture and enjoy. Moving from spring to summer reminds me, what had been lying dormant is now coming to life, to blossom and will bear fruit. From a resurrection perspective, despite all the troubles of the world, we can hold onto our Lord who has conquered death, confident that Jesus has the last word over the injustice and suffering we know of too well.

May is a busy time for Christians, remembering, celebrating, and being reminded of God's power and purposes in our world. In May we remember the moment Jesus ascended into heaven (the Ascension) traditionally 40 days after Easter, and just 10 days later that we remember the time when the Holy Spirit came with great gusto overcoming the crowds at Pentecost, 50 days after Easter. In the 10 day interim, known as a 'Novena', we pray with expectancy, reliving the wait of those early Christians that the Kingdom of God would come on earth as in Heaven. Jesus Christ was gone, but He promised to send the Holy Spirit to help us and be our guide, so Christians rededicate their dependency on God during this time.

Before Jesus ascended he commanded his followers to go and tell the good news to those who would listen; that same command remains for us today, with proclamation is the call to live and to 'be' the good news and demonstrate God's love. I leave you with a sonnet for Ascension Day by Malcom Guite.

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Continuing our trip up the B3048, Highway to the North - Part 3

Confusingly, Middleton was once both the name of the whole ambling parish and that of the main farmstead / settlement of the four Longparish '-tons'. Soon after passing Forton, Middleton House becomes visible, in its parkland on the rising ground to the left, the first of the great houses along this route. It and its 18th century predecessor buildings were the residence of members of the Widmore 'lords of the manor' and their trustees from 1698-1912, and the Wills family from 1926 to date, owners of the Middleton Estate.

Soon come the first signs of community provision: on the left, the cemetery of 1884, on land given by the Widmores, needed because the churchyard was full; the War Memorial stands in the cemetery; then, Longparish Village Hall of 1910, attractively modernised. To the right after the bends stands the primary school of 1837, with its integral preschool and school/community hall of 2005: beyond it is St Nicholas' church, dating from the 1100s (the priest's doorway in the chancel south wall). It is well-known that the long-serving vicar of the 19th century, Henry Burnaby Greene, diverted the main road to give his vicarage (now Woodbury House) a front garden, softening two right-angled turns—though more than a few others are still to come along the B3048.

But it is the sheer, random variety of the houses along the street which catches the eye, as in other villages. Thatched cottages, often conversions from two or three to the present one; detached houses; houses opening straight onto the winding road; bungalows; styles intermingling from the 17th to 21st centuries. It developed *ad hoc*, rather than by design, under the gradually tightening building controls from early last century. Most modern houses replace older buildings, work- or retail shops, dilapidated cottages etc. In this mix, the community-owned Plough Inn is an achievement.

Middleton ends, and the road, now bounded by fields, is accompanied by a stream on its left past two relics of 19th century paternalism, the public grindstone and Ash Burn Rest, a well and benches of 1868. To the right is the proud cricket field and play area (both courtesy of the Middleton Estate). Then comes West Aston (probably 'ash treesettlement'), the home of the majority of the population. While council housing of 1936-74 was well-built with goodsized gardens, perhaps because of land-ownership and the convenience of building designed estates, they are usually off the historic village main drag. And of course, many council houses are now privately owned. Such is North Acre, though blessed to have easy access to the only shop in the parish-indeed the only shop now actually fronting onto the whole B3048-and the newly-lamented Cricketers Inn.

Almost in sight now is Longparish House. But that's for next month...

LONGPARISH WILDLIFE GOOSANDER

I have a new bird for the village; a Goosander that takes my total of different birds seen in the village to 133.

This Goosander has been around most of the winter but has been evading me until it appeared at the Trout Farm's lake one morning. Goosanders are about the same size as a Mallard. The male has a dark green head (it looks black from a distance) white breast, sides and underneath, black back with a grey stripe running down to its tail, red beak and feet. They breed mostly in Scotland in late April-early May. They will nest in large nest boxes and holes in trees sometimes high up and the young will jump out and bounce on the ground unharmed. Only a few downy feathers line the nest, 8-11 eggs are laid and incubated for 30-32 days and leave the nest soon after being born. They will stay with the parents for 60-70 days before fledging. Their main food is fish which it will pursue at speed using its webbed feet for propulsion.

All the wet weather we have been having seems to have slowed the arrival of the summer migrants, as of writing this on April 16th, I have seen a few **Swallows**. I spotted the first on the 7th of April, which is 6 days later than last year. I haven't seen a **House Martin** yet. I saw my first baby **Blackbird** today. A few birds are feeding young; **Rooks**, **Robins**, **Little Grebe** and **Greylag** have babies and the **Swan** is back on her usual nest.

Mary Jo and Graham Leave Longparish after 64 years!




On Sunday 24th March Christine Beresford organised a wonderful tea party in the Village Hall to say goodbye to Mary Jo and Graham Darrah who have been in the same house in the village for 64 years. They are moving to a flat in Winchester, close to their daughter. 70 people attended, many of whom contributed to a sumptuous tea. Jeremy Barber, having done some careful research, gave an excellent speech.

Graham and Mary Jo met while undergraduates at Oxford. May Jo read history and Graham was on his second degree course reading forestry after natural sciences at Cambridge. After graduation in 1957 and a year in Norfolk, Graham was appointed a District Organiser for the South Western Woodlands Association. Colonel Dawnay, owner of Longparish House, and one of his first clients, offered him temporary(!) use of Saddlers Cottage which became their home when he married Mary Jo in 1959. There they brought up 4 children.

Their contribution to the local community and particularly the village has been amazing. Graham was school governor of their childrens' schools, Testbourne and Cricklade. He joined the Council of Hampshire Wildlife Trust soon after its creation and was subsequently Chairman for many years. He was a trustee of Bentley Wood, a nature conservation charity. In 2004 he was awarded the MBE for services to conservation in Hampshire. Mary Jo's achievements have been tireless and remarkable including these and many more:

- Parish Council member 34 years, chair 14 years
- Founder/creator of the parish playground
- Governor Longparish School 25 years, chair for 3.
- Member of steering group for new community hall, classrooms and Little School
- Joint creator of Friends of Longparish School (FoLS)
- Helped to start the Longparish Playgroup in 1970
- Jointly created Hill and Valley, many years as editor
- Researcher for registration of village Common Land
- Founder member village book group
- Head of History, Peter Symonds College Winchester

We raised a glass to them and gave thanks for their friendship and for enriching the lives of so many Longparish villagers and their children. This illustrated map of the village was originally created as a print for Mary-Jo and Graham Darrah when they left the village. 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
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Remembering 'Ella' Isobella Gibson Scott

18th November 1927 – 1st March 1924



Ella was born in Scotland on the 18^{th of} November 1927. She was the eldest of 6 children, two of whom died in infancy.

She lived and was brought up in Galloway, mainly living in the Grange of Cree farm and then in Polwhilly when she married her husband, Tom Scott.

As a farmer's wife, she was a very hardworking lady. Harvest times were particularly busy when all the family went to the fields laden with baskets of scones, pancakes, 'tattie' scones and huge tins of tea. At lambing time, the Rayburn in the kitchen always contained a newborn lamb or two in the bottom oven that needed to be fed several times a day (and night!).

Ella and Tom had three children, Isobel, Mabel and John and when they were teenagers the family moved south to Kimmer Farm, Faccombe in Hampshire and all her grandchildren can remember wonderful, free holidays there surrounded by farm animals plus chickens, turkeys and dogs.

In 1978 they moved to Sussex for a short time before coming to Longparish to retire in 1984. Tom died in 2000.

Ella loved her family, her neighbours and community. In short, she loved everyone she met and got to know, and there were plenty that felt that love.

She also loved nature, gardens & gardening as well as crafts and animals and her passion was contagious.

Sharing was in Ella's nature and there are many gardens in Longparish that contain plants that Ella shared, like marsh orchid plants. Walking around Longparish in late spring you can recognise them popping up in gardens across the village. I am sure there are many other plants throughout Longparish that Ella shared.

She also loved crafts & knitting, creating blankets for newborns and crafting all sorts, always sharing her wares & skills for the greater need.

Ella's other passion was cooking, and baking was her forte, always sharing her scones, cakes, sweet treats with family, friends & neighbours. Ella had quite the sweet tooth herself. Her signature dish was always her shortbread. This was sweet, full of love & passion, made for the joys of sharing. It was also unique.

Ella never forgot her roots and was in constant contact with her wider family by letter, plus frequent visits to relatives in Galloway. She would love to talk about her beloved Scotland and her life there. From breeding a particular breed of Turkish Chicken that she loved to raise, to taking in refugees during wartime. There were so many stories and she spoke so fondly of the people she welcomed.

Ella loved a 'Gathering' be it a tea party, bar-b-que, picnic or just a house visit, and she was never happier than when she was with her grandchildren and great grandchildren.

She made friends wherever she lived or visited and loved being involved with the Longparish Community, the Church, and other village activities which meant so much to her.

Ella – Sadly missed by her Family and friends.



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


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Longparish Little School

The six-minute feature was broadcast on 11 March, and it's already been evident that the Mill's profile has been raised as a result. The full clip is on ITVX We have a new screen in the Welcome Building which has been showing footage of ribbon weaving and production, and will feature other techniques too, and we hope that seeing the working inside the Mill will encourage more café users to cross the threshold into the Mill building and see our fascinating historic machinery and many information panels.

National Mills Weekend 2024, 11th–12th May, 10.30am–5pm

In celebration of the engineers and millwrights who built and now restore and maintain Whitchurch Silk Mill, Nigel Spender of G & H Spender Engineering, a historic Basingstoke company specialising in industrial heritage conservation and restoration, will be here to talk to visitors about the many crafts used during his company's recent conservation of the Mill's Grade Two* listed Georgian waterwheel, and the historic craft of millwrighting. Included with admission fee or annual pass.

10,000 Years of Textiles, 15th May, 7-8.30pm

In this illustrated talk Angela Pawlyn, a member of the Oxford and Kennet Valley Guilds of Weavers Spinners and Dyers, will show examples of preserved textiles. ST ANDREWS WILDFLOWER MEADOW



The churchyard is a haven for wildlife: snowdrops and primroses flourish there during the early months of the year. The grass in this area will be allowed to grow and we hope that flowers whose seeds have been dormant in the ground will spring to life over the summer, and the churchyard will become a destination for butterflies, bees and insects.



ANDOVER TREES: DIAMOND WOOD

he Diamond Wood was formed in 2012 as part of the late Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Sixty, 60-acre woodlands were created across the country and Andover's Diamond Wood forms 44 acres of the Hampshire 60. Andover Trees United, a community organisation focusing on environmental conservation education and the originator of the Diamond Wood project, was initially allocated 12 acres to plant and manage as community woodland. Over ten years 2012-2022, the group supported 10,000 children from local schools to plant what is now known as 'Harmony Woods' with 10,000 trees. Hampshire County Council contracted out the rest of the planting, with ATU looking after it from then onwards.

By the end of 2022, the lease to manage the whole site had been transferred to Andover Trees United, along with the corresponding England Woodland Grant Scheme Funds. This will allow the Charity to bring much needed improvements and aid responsible access to the wood in the form of waymarked paths and information boards.

Happy Earth Day!

Earth Day is an international annual event on April 22nd to demonstrate support for environmental protection. This year, ATU is excited to announce that they are working with National Geographic on the long overdue upgrade to the Diamond Wood! The team will be working together with ATU's regular Volunteer Conservation Team to put in sign posts to help visitors know which permissive paths to use. This will help to reduce the soil erosion that is taking place at the bottom (eastern) end of the Wood, protecting the plant and animal life there.

Diamond Wood Upgrade!

Andover Trees United has plans to protect and improve biodiversity across the whole Diamond Wood over the next few years. We aim to help our visitors to access the woodland responsibly to conserve the nature that calls the wood home. The single Right of Way (RoW), the East Anton sports field/ Smannell footpath, that crosses the wood will not be affected, but there are several permissive paths that will be changing over the coming months, with new signage to help visitors to find their way. And signage is just the beginning! ATU will be working hard to transform the eastern end to create a brand new chalk grassland meadow starting next year, 2025! Spanning a 3-year project, there will be numerous community events that will inform, encourage participation and allow the community to enjoy the space. We will also be holding expert talks, community arts, fundraising, wildflower seed sowing and planting events. Toads on the Roads 2024



We have had a confusing patrol season starting at the end of January caused by the very early warm nights persuading some of them to arrive long before usual. The main arrivals were still around their usual Valentine's Day, followed by for another month

scattered arrivals for another month.

Towards the end the pregnant females with males on their backs started to turn away from the gate on arrival which totally confused us until we realised rats had started to attack them just inside the gate. I spent a couple of days ferrying them to the water to escape the rats. Normally they have not mated by March 31st which is the date we have stopped in previous years because of the clocks changing causing much lighter evenings. We rescued 542 toads this year with 40 sadly squashed.

Many of these would have been visible and stationary in car headlights if drivers would only slow down and look at the road when they see our signs up and us out patrolling. Thank you so much to our wonderful team of 27 keen patrollers this year who did 117 hours of unpredictable volunteering between them. CH

We are delighted to announce that **Harriet Dickinson** has agreed to take on the role and will be the President designate until her formal election at the next Flower Show AGM. Harriet has been part of the flower show for over 36 years, 25yrs as Vice Chairman and 5yrs as Chairman. She is passionate that everyone should get involved in this much loved village event and that everybody should try and take part - regardless of the quality, it's the taking part that counts.

Keep on sowing - most vegetable seeds can be sown this month if you missed the opportunity in April. Sowing in the greenhouse then hardening off the young plants before planting out reduces slug attacks. Crops to sow under cover for planting out in June include French & Runner beans, courgettes, squash, and sweetcorn. Alternatively visit garden centres, supermarkets, or the Hurstbourne Priors May Fair where there is typically a large selection of vegetable plugs. Plant out Sweet Peas - keep them well watered and feed once a week. Keep mounding up soil around the stems of the seed potatoes. Sprinkle fertiliser round the base of hedges and shrubs. Put supports in for tall growing border plants. Prepare for the Chelsea Chop! Keep an eye on the weather and watch out for frost!

This month look out for free plants - seedlings that may have sprouted from your border plants that can be transplanted or potted up to give to friends or indeed the Flower show plant stall!! Think of us too when lifting and dividing clumps of congested perennials.

HELP WANTED - If you are able to spare a few hours to volunteer on either Friday evening, Saturday morning or early evening to help set up and dismantle the showground, we would be very grateful. All are welcome as there are many jobs including setting up tables and chairs and erecting tents and gazebos. We also need a generous person/s to donate some traditional straw/hay bales to use around the showground for various purposes. We normally auction them off or give them away to a deserving cause after the show but would be flexible with this if required. About 40 to 50 bales are needed.

Postcard from Binley

The dawn chorus this morning at 5.30 was so intense it drowned out the sound of the rookery. I just had to throw open the bedroom window and drink it all in. Light overnight rain had fallen on recently unfurled leaves that were a verdant, iridescent green. The scent was intoxicating! A gentle southern breeze carried with it the soft bleating of lambs on the downs and above me kites set off from their roosts in the park. Spring in Binley.

How magical! With bed hair like the Nutty Professor and scratching my backside I went downstairs to put the kettle on as another day in Paradise began. I was pleased to see on local social media that many people are spotting trout as they walk along the banks of the Bourne. With a head of water like this they should be spread right up the valley maybe as far as Hurstbourne Tarrant; I've certainly seen them there before. I don't know if any effluent is being pumped into our little stream, I do hope not. I do know there are grave concerns around Chilbolton I think. Surely, we cannot go on like this. Interestingly apart from the odd eel the only fish I have ever spotted here are trout, not

even a Grayling makes its way up here. But there must be Miller's Thumb, Brook Lamprey, minnows



even? Salmon used to get up as high as Longparish, and many years ago I saw a couple of fish on what they call the half water. They were carrying some disease I recall. Brian Hague, the Landlord of the White Hart in Stoke famously landed a salmon just below the bridge by the pub some years ago. If you don't believe me the photograph of fish and angler are behind the bar.

So there! Last week I was introduced to a pair of Patterdale terriers. I should correct myself, a pair of Patterdale terriers were introduced to me! Anyone who is familiar with this breed and values a full set of eight fingers will know not to be presumptuous. Their names were Gerald and Norman and I know this because they were painted on the back of the old oak lambing chairs they were sitting on by a smouldering open fire. I was at a large rambling old house in Itchen Abbas, purely a commercial visit. The house was completely covered in scaffolding. Not as I initially thought part of an extensive renovation project but there simply, so the old place didn't fall down! The owner, an ample woman in multiple layers of clothing with a designer baler twine belt was posher than the dear departed old Queen and fouler mouthed than that awful chef Ramsay. On her head sat a wide brimmed khaki hat that I last saw on John Mills head in "Ice cold in Alex!" Pouring us both a gin at 10.30am my first thoughts were "Here's a woman I can get on with"! Mountains of paperwork were piled up on every available surface and a kind of made-up bed of sorts was by the fire. I got the feeling that this was the only liveable room in the entire place. I thought back to the wonderful lady that lived at Pill Heath on the way to Tangley all those years ago. I can't remember her name or why she lived in a shed at the back and not the house, but I think she was making a stand against Maggie's poll tax? Anyway, the whole point of this story is to alert you to the fact that there is virtually a "National Day" for just about every cause imaginable? How about one to celebrate these magnificent old dames? They won't be around for ever! NA



Grayling: The Lady of the Stream

If I asked you to name a chalk stream fish, which one would you choose? For many, the brown trout or Atlantic salmon



will come to mind – the most famous fishy mascots of these rare freshwater habitats. But today we're looking at another amazing member of the salmonid family: the **European Grayling**. Or, to use its wonderfully romantic nickname, the 'Lady of the Stream'.

The grayling belongs to the genus *Thymallus* – so named because its members exude a faint scent of thyme. Although widespread across Europe and native to England, this fish was not originally found in the Test and Itchen. Records suggest that it was introduced to these rivers in the early 19th and 20th centuries respectively, possibly by moving fish from the Hampshire Avon.

Ironically, grayling would later be routinely culled in many southern chalk streams, due to fears of them out-competing brown trout. This practice declined as studies showed key differences in the diet, growth, habitat, and spawning behaviour of the two species. Today, grayling are particularly popular with anglers, as they can be pursued in the winter when brown trout are prohibited.

The grayling can be recognised by its glittering pewter scales and red-fringed dorsal fin. This ruby colour is much brighter in the males, especially during the breeding season. From March to May each year, they attempt to woo females with a vibrating dance. Fertilised eggs are nestled in the gravelly stream bed and – if all goes well – two to four weeks later, the water is filled with baby grayling!

After hatching, juveniles stick to the slower-flowing stream margins until they get large enough to swim further out. As they grow, their diet expands to include worms, insect larvae, and small crustaceans like freshwater shrimp. Grayling can gain twice the weight that trout and salmon manage in their first year but end up a little smaller – the largest adults weigh around two kilograms.

Grayling need cool, clean, oxygen-rich water, in addition to areas of silt-free gravel for spawning. If their homes aren't healthy, then sadly they can struggle to thrive. 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
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Remembering...

Melanie Nixon

23rd August 1942 – 10th March 2024

Melanie was born on Sunday 23rd August 1942 in Edgware, Brent, London. She was the first child and eldest daughter of Irene and Gordon Darwood. Jean and John (twins) followed in 1944, then Barbara and finally Brian, a family of five children.

During her early childhood, Melanie went to live with her grandparents in Dorset for six weeks with whom she formed a strong bond. Her enjoyment of company, good food and entertaining, and smart stylish clothes may perhaps be attributed to this early influence on her. She maintained high standards throughout her life.



After leaving school and training as a shorthand/typist, Melanie married Bobby Nixon and they had two sons, Robert and Richard. Her talents were fully developed when she and Bobby started working for the American direct-selling company Tupperware in the 1970's. Melanie started as a Party hostess, progressed to be a manager, and subsequently became the Tupperware distributor for South East London in charge of a huge operation involving over 300 dealers and 24 managers whilst Bobby fully supported her by running the Storage and Distribution network.

Melanie & Bobby retired from Tupperware in the early 1980s and moved to Field House, south of Newbury. She then put her business skills and outgoing personality to good use by selling freehold properties in some of the most beautiful resorts in Spain, France, Portugal and North America. She also became actively involved in her son Robert's property development business in Turkey.

In 1998, Melanie moved from Newbury to Norfolk where she ran a successful 5-star B&B establishment. Unfortunately, she was diagnosed with cancer in 2002. Over the years, Melanie underwent a series of different treatments. She put all her intelligence and determination into supporting new drug trials, alternative remedies and diets. These resulted in long periods of remission which she embraced with optimism whilst actively taking part in and enjoying social and community activities. Melanie was supported at all times by an underlying belief in Christian spirituality and a positive attitude to getting things done and helping others.

She moved from Norfolk to her beloved home, Snowdrops in Stoke in 2011 where she soon became involved in village life. She was a helper and soup cook for the monthly Lunch Club; she joined the Walk4Health walking group; set up a Ladies social group (the Phoenix Club); and was a stalwart supporter of the Stoke Village Fund masterminding the Apple Juice project and pioneering the Phonebox Library. She also ran *Snowdrops* as a successful B&B, found time to pursue her great love of gardening (which included growing wonderful dahlias for local church decorations), and was a generous hospitable host to friends and family visitors. During this time, her Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma returned, but fortunately she was referred to Professor Peter Johnson of Southampton Hospital, the UK's leading expert in this cancer. His care and treatment enabled Melanie to enjoy many extra years of quality life and Melanie recognised this with a substantial legacy to support research into Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma.

Unfortunately, after falling and breaking a leg in October last year, Melanie's health took a downward turn. She spent eight weeks in East Surrey hospital and it was subsequently discovered that the lymphoma had returned.

The family are so grateful for the care that Melanie received from Dr Lickman at the local medical practice and from all the staff at The Countess of Brecknock Hospice, including the provision of at-home nursing care which enabled Melanie to have a peaceful and pain-free passing on 10th March.

Her life was celebrated with a special Service in St Peter's, St Mary Bourne, superbly led by Rev'd Canon Dodie. Two Eulogies were shared together with a large screen video showing many photos of Melanie's five grandchildren whom she adored and her many friends.
