#### HARVEST FESTIVAL

For many people in Britain, "Harvest Festival" conjures up memories of lugging a tin of baked beans or a bag of slightly squashed apples into school, where they would be displayed on a table next to a large wicker basket and then redistributed to the local food bank or an elderly neighbour. For others, it recalls hymns like We plough the fields and scatter—sung with varying degrees of enthusiasm, depending on the lure of biscuits after the service. Yet behind the nostalgia and the tins of Spam is a festival with deep Christian roots.

Harvest Festival, as celebrated in churches today, is a way of saying "thank you" to God for His provision. The Bible is packed with references to harvest. In the Old Testament, Israel had agricultural festivals such as the *Feast of Weeks* and the *Feast of Tabernacles*, when the people brought the firstfruits of their crops to God in gratitude and trust. The principle was simple but profound: the harvest is not just the result of human effort but a gift from the Creator who sends sun and rain.

In the New Testament, the language of harvest is often used metaphorically. Jesus speaks of the fields being "ripe for harvest," pointing not to wheat or barley but to people ready to hear good news. The Apostle Paul echoes the theme when he encourages generosity, reminding the church that "whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly." For Christians, harvest is not only about crops but about lives bearing fruit—acts of kindness, justice, and love that nourish communities.

Of course, the modern British harvest looks rather different from biblical times. Few of us are threshing grain in our back gardens. Instead, we queue in supermarkets and debate whether we really need twelve types of pumpkin spice product in September. One vicar I know joked that in his parish the most common harvest "firstfruit" was not apples or

courgettes, but packets of pasta nearing their sell-by date. Yet even here the Christian meaning shines through. When a congregation gathers their tins, jars, and toiletries for a local charity, they are participating in the ancient rhythm of giving thanks and sharing blessings.

There is something disarming about a festival that teaches gratitude in an age of instant consumption. I once heard a farmer say that every year at harvest he feels both relief and humility: relief that the crop is safely gathered in, and humility that so much of the process - weather, soil, growth - is outside human control. Harvest is also a reminder of hope. Just as the land yields its crop in due time, so God's kingdom grows quietly but surely, even when unseen. The season whispers that life is more than endless emails and weekly shopping runs; it is rooted in rhythms of gift, grace, and gratitude.

So next time you find yourself singing 'Come, ye thankful people, come', or stacking tins for a collection, remember: you are part of a tradition stretching back thousands of years. And if your contribution happens to be a lonely can of chickpeas, take heart - God can work with loaves and fishes. He can certainly cope with legumes!

### WEATHER: AUGUST 2025

The Southeast and Central Southeast of England recorded an average temperature of 23.4°C and a mean of 17.8°C. Sunshine hours were the highest in the country at 223.8, and rainfall was 31.3mm the region's weather was dominated by the heatwave, with prolonged dry and sunny spells.

As the UK looks back on one of its warmest summers on record, many have noticed a surprising change in the landscape. The country experienced what the Met Office call a 'false autumn', a phenomenon where the stress of extreme summer conditions prompts trees and plants to behave as if the season has changed, even though it was still late August.

Locally here now though we return to our true Autumn colours and face more turbulent skies....




#### THE SKIES ABOVE US


### **FULL STEAM AHEAD**

### "THE HISTORY OF HURSTBOURNE PRIORS"

OCTOBER 25th HURSTBOURNE PRIORS VILLAGE HALL 7.30pm

With wine and refreshments and a raffle to raise funds for the refurbishment of the Pavilion

It all began last year with the discovery of human remains at the edge of the recreation ground when the new drainage system was being installed. Enter HM Constabulary and then County Archaeologist Mr David Hopkins....

It turns out that we live in a truly historical landscape, Hurstbourne was first mentioned as a place in 790 and Priors was added in the 12th Century when the land was given to the Priors of St Swithens. There is earlier evidence of life here in the Bourne Valley, from neolithic times in the form of crude tools and pottery, to iron age coins and spear heads found by many metal detectorists. The Romans also had a large settlement where Andover now is and gave us the Harroway amongst other legacies.

Hurstbourne Priors was a key staging post for coaches on the London turnpike to Salisbury in the 18th century. The railway lines which used to criss cross this area were vital to both wars efforts as they connected the sawmills and the ammunition depots at Longparish with the mainline at Hurstbourne. These lines were also interlinked with the cressbeds, of which there used to be many, whisking the cress to London and further afield.

On the **25**<sup>th</sup> **October** David Hopkins has offered to bring the history of our wonderful village to life, supported by pictures and artefacts he will give an insight into who lived here before us.

There will be a small charge of £5 for wine and nibbles as well as a raffle to help raise funds for the refurbishment of the Pavilion. The talk will start at 8pm and there will be an opportunity to ask David questions over further refreshments afterwards.

#### CRICKET PAVILION UPDATE

Pollowing our ongoing fundraising efforts, including the contributions from the May Fair, we would like to publish an update on how the refurbishment of this building is progressing.



Having called in various experts the refurbishment task is much greater than the Parish Council first thought. For this beautiful building to be brought back to good condition and to serve our community for another 100 years is going to be a long and expensive project. Our first setback was discovering that the drainage system was failing, and totally irreparable, which given the Pavilion's situation could have had adverse consequences for the River Bourne and onwards to the River Test should it fail completely. The rules and regulations to protect Sites of Special Scientific interest meant that a massive £14,000 had to be spent installing a new 'closed' sewage and drainage system.

The next setback was a pinhole leak in one of the original copper pipes which meant that we had to install new piping as the leak was causing damage to the wooden walls and floor.

We refurbished the kitchen four years ago which has been a tremendous improvement and has increased our rental opportunities as well as being well received by our cricketers. Our current project funding total stands at £23,000 but we still have a bit to go. The thatching alone will cost £30,000. We have a Master

Thatcher booked in for April 2026, with strict instruction that they finish by the May Fair weekend.

As many of you know, the Parish Council are keen to get the rest of the Pavilion refurbished as soon as the roof is fixed. The changing room floors are in a poor state, especially given the plumbing leak earlier this year. The showers are in desperate need of modernisation and the windows need a lot of love.

The Parish Council has applied for several Grants from Local Charities, Sports Bodies and Local Government and we are waiting, with fingers crossed, for a decision from Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council regarding a Community Fund application. If anyone has contacts within a grant giving body we would be delighted to hear from you, as any help is very welcome.

### REMEMBERING BARBARA CARRODUS

On Saturday, 13<sup>th</sup> September, we celebrated the life of **Barbara Carrodus** with a service of thanksgiving in St Andrew's Church. Before the service, Barbara's ashes were buried in a grave next to that of Harry Plunket Greene, the Irish baritone and fly-fisherman who lived in Hurstbourne Priors in the early 1900s. Barbara's family had a connection to Harry Plunket Greene through her great grandfather Robert Carrodus, a violinist who accompanied and performed with Plunket Greene.

Another connection is with the Elwes family: Gervase Elwes a distinguished tenor was a close friend of Plunket Greene. Following the death of Gervase in a railroad accident in Boston at the height of his career in 1921, Plunket Greene and other musicians founded the Musicians' Benevolent Fund, now called Help Musicians, in memory of their friend. Donations to Help Musicians were invited in memory of Barbara.

Barbara will be fondly remembered by her friends and family, and we offer our sympathy to her husband Jim and her sister Ann.

It runs to a modest 38 pages in comparison to Fort's 344 and is described as 'A Journey from Wherwell to Hurstbourne Tarrant, Hampshire'. Both are slim enough to slip into a car glove locker or rucksack, but B3048 is beautifully illustrated in colour with its author's photographs and helpful small maps to guide either motorist or, perhaps the braver walker, to 'dawdle' along its 11.1 miles (17.9 km) route. They are sure to be entertained by text describing all that is worthy of note or notice along the way. Who now can recall the longclosed Fullerton Junction and Hurstbourne railway line, or the history of Longparish and its big House, or the Methodist chapel, at Hurstbourne Priors, demolished in 1968? Nor are the parish churches along the way ignored. Their excellent photos alone invite pauses to explore further both inside and out.

Modestly priced at £5, including p.&p. from coppenma@1and3.org.uk, this informative and often entertaining little book could well be the start of many more, or be seen as a challenge to others to write, photograph and publish accounts of their favourite B and C road routes around Andover. ### History of the Hill & Valley area in Ten Objects

### 8 - St Mary Bourne School wall inscription



Somewhat weathered through these last 165 years, this plague is high on the east gable elevation. '1860 NATIONAL SCHOOLS' records the completion of the original school building in the local brick and flint style.

The Hampshire Chronicle describes the great celebrations on 13 July 1861, the day of the school's public opening. A VIP invitation-only banquet preceded the opening ceremony. Over 340 people were present at the dedication Service and there were speeches by the Earl of Portsmouth, the principal donor; the bishop of Winchester; and finally the Hon. & Revd Samuel Best of Abbotts Ann, the untiring local champion of all-age education. For it was a National Society, i.e. Church of England, school. The children of dissenting parents of the nearby Methodist and Baptist chapels were nevertheless warmly welcome, it was stressed.

However, in this then poor parish, the running costs were hard to collect over the next 15 years. So, given a change in the law, in 1875 it became a better-funded Board, i.e. government school, under the chairmanship of Dr Joseph Stevens. Non-denominational from that time, it eventually became a county primary, as the national rules changed. So, it's all a bit technical, but the inscription describes only the first 15 of the school's current 165 year life.

As a footnote, quietly mentioned among the visiting clergy at the 1861 opening was a certain 'Revd Keble', John Keble of Hursley, a nationally famous clergyman. Look him up, should you not have heard of him.

#### LONGPARISH WILDLIFE MARSH HARRIER

We have a new bird for the village, a juvenile Marsh Harrier which was photographed, sadly not by me, on the road by the old chapel and in the Christmas tree field. I have never seen a juvenile Marsh Harrier before, but it was identified by Kath and Martin Clay. They are about the same size as a Buzzard but built a bit different. Slim head, and body, long wings, long tail, and legs. Juveniles are mahogany brown with white head, neck and throat.



The adult male has pale white head and breast, pale grey tail, and brown, grey upperparts. Underparts are pale with some reddish colouring. The wing tips are black. Marsh Harriers nest on the ground in thick marshy vegetation, made on a substantial pile of grass, reeds and small sticks. 3-8 eggs are laid, rounded oval, bluish-or greenish white, often becoming stained during incubation. The eggs are incubated for 31-38 days. Often, they will have a second brood and fledge in 35-40 days. They hunt for food by flying back and forth over reedbeds. Once the prey has been located it drops with claws held out. Prey is chiefly small mammals (especially rodents) and birds, they will also take birds sitting on nest in the reeds. Marsh Harriers have been in decline but are making a slow recovery. The juvenile seen in Longparish was on migration all the way to Sub-Saharan Africa.

Congratulations to Longparish 1st team who have been crowned Champions of Hampshire County Division 3C. Despite

#### Avian Trichomonosis (aka Canker)

Cases of trichomonosis, aka canker, have been confirmed in Longparish. This disease leads to a growth in the bird's throat which eventually prevents swallowing and causes starvation. It is highly contagious to many bird species and is easily passed on around feeding and watering stations.

Wiltshire Wildlife Hospital advise sterilisation of all bird feeders/baths/watering stations every week for a month at least, with a 5% bleach solution (50ml bleach to 1 litre of water). The British Trust for Ornithology further recommends removing bird feeding/watering stations for 2 weeks to reduce spread of the disease.

Avian trichomonosis is not contagious to humans, however reasonable care should be taken to wear gloves when sterilising feeders and baths, and cleaning utensils used for this should not be used elsewhere.





The range of activities this year offered something for everyone. The dog show once again proved a big hit, with an array of fantastic entrants that drew smiles from spectators and judges alike. The egg-throwing finale was enjoyed by all generations, and it was fantastic to see so many people of different ages taking part and cheering each other on.

Entertainment came in many forms. Simon Chainey's fire display left the crowd in awe, while Kelly's aerial silks had people queuing up to give it a try, a true spectacle of courage and balance. Andover Castles brought along some fantastic bouncy castles that were a huge hit with the children, while the Three Bees Project delighted visitors with goat handling sessions. We were also treated to a brilliant display from Two Birds Flying Experience, showcasing their incredible birds of prey. 
