Gervase Phinn, the wonderful Yorkshire Rural Schools' English inspector tells the story of a nativity play he was invited to in a small rural school. You may remember it. He writes:

Mary and Joseph made their way towards the inn and the little boy playing Joseph, took centre stage and without a trace of nerves beckoned Mary to hurry up. She arrived on stage looking worried as she pulled behind her a large cardboard-polystyrene donkey. 'Come on, hurry up' urged Joseph as he banged on the door. With no answer he banged again. Joseph shouted 'Innkeeper, innkeeper, let us come in'. Opening the door just enough to see his face the Innkeeper replied 'There's no room'. 'Joseph undeterred said, 'We've been up hill and down dale and we're fit to drop'. 'Can't help that' replied the Innkeeper, 'there's no room'.

'Look, I've got a wife out here on a donkey' Joseph gestured to Mary standing motionless and staring in fright at the audience. 'Well she'd better get a move on and you can't leave that donkey there, you'll have to move it' 'Then give us a room, she's having a baby'. 'Well I can't help that' it's nowt to do with me'. And Joseph beginning to despair replied: 'I know, it's nowt to do with me neither'." @ Gervase Phinn: A Wayne in a Manger 2005

So onto 2026: What can we do to improve mind, body and spirit? The TV presenter Dr Michael Moseley gave us some brilliant ideas when he suggested we do JUST ONE THING -Here are some suggestions for 2026:

Exercise and physical activity - Stand on one leg: Improves balance.

Learn a new skill: It can improve brain function and mental agility.

Walk, but leave your devices at home: You can take in all around you without distraction.

Diet and nutrition - Eat slowly: Improves digestion and lowers blood sugar.

Cook from scratch: Provides more benefits.

Enjoy oily fish: It's good for your brain and heart

Mindfulness and mental wellbeing - Read a poem: A simple way to boost your brain.

Learn to control your breath: Lowers anxiety & enhances


decision-making.


Put your phone down: Boosts brain power and well-being.

Remembrance 2025

As usual, there was a high turnout for the Remembrance Sunday service. The Reverend Canon Dodie Marsden officiated at both the War Memorial and afterwards at St Peter's Church. A wreath was laid on behalf of the village at the War Memorial by Colonel Charlie Blount (Retd), the senior officer on parade. He also recited "The Exhortation". Lieutenant James Croser RN (Retd) read the Roll of Honour and the "Kohima Epitaph". Major Michael Malyon (Retd) read "In Flanders Fields". The bugler was William de Penning (aged 12), who played "The Last Post" and "Reveille". Captain Jeremy Barkes (Retd) read the lesson.

The Royal British Legion contingent numbered twelve and was marched from the forming up point at The George to the War Memorial, and back to St Peter's Church, by Petty Officer Dan Anderson (Retd), who was again replete with pace stick.

The following day some 170 people gathered for a lecture at the Village Centre arranged by the serving and veteran community of St Mary Bourne, to raise funds for the Poppy Appeal and St Peter's Church.

The speaker was General Sir Richard Shirreff KCB CBE, former Deputy Supreme Allied Commander Europe (DSACEUR), 2011-14. His subject was "The Strategic Impact of Russia's War with Ukraine and whither NATO". His message was sobering and derived from first-hand experience of dealing with the Russians as DSACEUR when Russia first sent its "green men" to Crimea. He warned that Russia only understands strength and that NATO members must rebuild their military capabilities in order deter Russian expansionism.

The event generated a surplus of £2,013.58, of which £1,313.58 was donated to the Poppy Appeal and £700 was donated to St Peter's Church, St Mary Bourne.



In addition, Colonel Tom Vallings (Retd), Poppy Appeal coordinator for the parish, arranged for collection boxes to be placed across St Mary Bourne, Binley and Egbury, which raised a further £1,175.42. They were kindly hosted by The Village Shop, The George Inn, The Surgery, Vitacress, Pick Your Own, St Mary Bourne Primary School, The Bourne Valley Inn, Apsley Farms and St Peter's Church. The collection at St Peter's Church on Remembrance Sunday raised £328.10.

On behalf of the Royal British Legion, the serving and veteran community of St Mary Bourne would like to thank all who contributed so generously to this year's Poppy Appeal. The parish raised a total of £2,806.80 for the Poppy Appeal plus a further £700 for St Peter's Church, a grand total of £3,506.80 - a fantastic effort.

The **Parish Council** held its monthly meeting on Tuesday 11th November.

Work on the **new playground area** is now complete, and it will shortly be open for use, but replacing the fence along the edge of the Rec, resurfacing the MUGA and the additional car parking area, and

lastly marking out parking bays will follow over the next few weeks. This will involve a short-term closure of most of the car park, but it will be publicised in advance.

Councillor Tanya Mew is now co-ordinator for **Neighbourhood Watch** and is contacting past team members, and plans to expand the community's involvement as far as possible.

The Highways group are looking at options to improve **road safety** in St Mary Bourne at the crossing of the Test Way path over the road at the bottom of Bourne Hill (or Roman Road) before meeting Hampshire County Council to discuss implementation.

A committee has been formed to prepare for the replacement of the **Sports Pavilion** and is currently composed of members of the Cricket Club the Parish Council and members of the community.

As proposed plans get more detailed there will be an opportunity for the community to look at them and bring ideas to the committee.

As in prior years, the Committee has concentrated the distribution of funds to local charities and causes, with 17 grants and a further donation to the school, which added to the proceeds from the sales of teas and cakes.

The total distributed is £6,800 as shown in the table.

Postcard from Binley

I'd been enjoying November with its mushy, slushy damp and its smoky, misty mornings and evenings. But now winter has arrived with an icy wind ripping across the Binley Downs causing sheep to huddle up in field corners and against hedgerows, now bare of leaf, the last fruits hanging and rotting. This morning's frost was iron hard, and I walked my dog this afternoon with wet sleet slapping my face as I came down from the old cattle drove. As dusk closes in, the rookery takes to the wing for a final noisy hurrah before settling in the beech accompanied by a gentle soporific cackle. At that point the Kites ghost in, ones and twos at first before whole squadrons arrive. I so love the seasons in this country; I will never tire of them. I can embrace winter just as much as I can summer. And the countryside gives you so many options to get out there and do something! We are truly spoiled.

Driving home from Marlborough the other day I cut across by Marsh Benham and followed my nose home. I do this a lot, and you get to see places you didn't know existed. You also get hopelessly lost but there is always the sat nav to save your bacon. But I mention this because I spotted a white pheasant in a field and I haven't seen one in ages. Back in the 90's every shoot, however small, had a white pheasant on the ground each season. As the first sloe gin was necked keepers would take great delight in telling you that there was a £100 fine for anyone who shot the white pheasant. But of course, it's not just pheasants. I've seen a white Starling of all things, but it was stuffed and mounted and sat on Micky Wedge's telly. I think he also had a white stoat, but I can't be sure. His sitting room was full of stuffed creatures.

The White Hart in Stoke is not named after some mythological creature but a true white deer. Probably Fallow as they are far more numerous than Red deer. I have seen a Red White Hart up in Sutherland where it was pointed out to me by a ghillie, but I must confess it was more of a disappointingly dingey pale grey. I used to drink in a pub called The Bald-Faced Stag. I thought this was a reference to colour but educating myself about old English, I think it refers more to a bold, brazen animal as we all know Stags can be during autumn. It's a nice name either way.

Forty years ago, we had a white hare here in Binley which hung around the fields down by the S bend. Drinkers in the Hurdlers Arms would get Press Ganged by Joe Hirst to go hare catching to supply hares for the Waterloo Cup up at Great Altcar, Lancs. We had a lot of hares here back then; Dunley, Corbett's, Maclay's certainly never shot any as a favour to Joe. I had the honour of touching the creature as it was spared the nets and ran through my legs on one occasion! A magic moment. Of course, if you drank in The George, you could be press ganged by the late Paul Howard to crew his yacht, the Gay Fox. Stories of these sailings are legendary and Pat Cryan tells the best one. I was first introduced to Paul in the Hurdlers Arms one Sunday lunchtime a lifetime ago. Dressed immaculately in a navy blazer and MCC tie he was a picture of decorum. However, to take the edge off it somewhat, he was sitting in the sink in the gents with his trousers round his ankles. It didn't seem to phase him, and he chatted and conversed with visitors to the urinals as if it were a vicarage tea party. Interesting character was Paul.

History of the Hill & Valley area in Ten Objects 10 - St Mary Bourne, Water Meadow



This series ends with a whimper...

An undated (1970s), aerial photograph looks roughly west over the then new lake, and the meadow opposite Derrydown surgery. In that meadow, the river runs too geometrically to be natural. Compared with its course on the 1848 Tithe Map (inset), it has indeed been redirected, with two sluice gates, just visible on the photo, at and near the bend. There are lines of other channels too on the grass.

When the field was grazed, you could spot other water meadow features, small bridges and culverts. This field was clearly being worked as a water meadow in the later 19th and early 20th century—not the only one in these parishes. This ingenious system meant that fresh water constantly flowed over the meadow, eliminating standing water. By floating the fields early in the year, between Christmas and March, the farmer could reduce the effects of frost and gain an early growth of grass, so the sheep needed overwintering for a shorter period.

Selective floating could also grow a later hay crop by keeping the soil moist. It was skilful farming. And all it now leaves in the field is the delicate lines of the old drains, with a few half-buried stone and brick structures to trip over. A vanishing agricultural history.





St Mary Bourne Primary School

It is a busy time of year at school; there are

lots of events and festivities before the end of term.

We recently celebrated

European Languages Day, with the children listening to different languages and finding out more about different countries. Across the school, the children found out about famous landmarks, artwork and cultural events.



We held our Harvest Festival, led by the



school councillors and raised 100.49 kg in donations for Andover Foodbank. We marked *Anti-bullying Week* by challenging the children to do one kind thing every day, this year's theme was *'Power for Good'*. Children also wore

something spotty or Pudsey themed accessories and raised over £150 for this year's **Children in Need** appeal.

At St Mary Bourne School we have Junior Road Safety Officers, who are children appointed to promote road safety in



their school community. Our JRSOs attended an interactive and informative training session led by the Hampshire Road Safety team and created *Be Bright, Be Seen* **tee-shirts**.

Furthermore, we had an interesting assembly from the CA Ecology team who did some research into the bats that live in

our school building. We have three types in the school - serotine, brown long eared and common pipistrelle bats. One evening when the team came to the school to observe the bats they counted over 40 bats from nine different locations. The serotine



roost is a maternity roost, with only a handful of other roosts documented in the County so the school is a very important site for bats.

Being a School Governor

I became a co-opted Governor at St Mary Bourne Primary School in 2022, having had my arm twisted by another local! Naturally, I was initially nervous about what might be expected of me - but I hoped that my business and general 'life' experiences might prove useful, along with my love of little ones! I am SO pleased I took the plunge; I believe that this journey has turned out to be a 'win-win' both for the school and for me!

Being a governor gives me the chance to chat with the children and teachers during school visits and see how the school operates from the inside to the outside. In return I try to lighten the load across a range of areas from compliance, to safeguarding, to ongoing training and development. Like other governors, I act as a sounding board for the teaching staff and parents, helping resolve issues and taking on board suggestions. The whole idea is that the professional staff are freed up to do the very best for the children.

The basic commitment is one monthly term-time meeting (at school or on-line), usually on a Monday evening between 6 and 8pm. Every governor is encouraged to take on an area or responsibility (I look after development and training, and I also serve on the pay panel). We do governor visits to the school to support pupils and staff, monitor progress and ensure our finances are used effectively. There is plenty of support and training available to us to help us maximise our effectiveness, along with many opportunities to improve our individual skills.

We have an impressive team of governors at the school – some with many years of experience and others with very little. Our monthly meetings are conducted with a lot of humour and fun while ensuring our governance is effective and compliant.

Do please consider joining us. St Mary Bourne is a very special village school with the most amazing, caring staff and delightful pupils. We have vacancies for two co-opted governors right now. We will "hold your hand" until you feel settled – then you can start making a difference too!

Remembering...

Rosan Winfred Porter

31st October 1934 - 2nd October 2025

Compiled from tributes given at the Thanksgiving Service in St Peter's Church on Wednesday 12th November.



Rosan was born on 31st October 1934 on the Isle of Wight. She was the daughter of Richard Osbaldeston Spencer-Smith & Christian Louise (neé Passy) Spencer-Smith. She had two older brothers, Roland and Drummond.

Rosan came from a military background on both sides of her family and was extremely proud of its long connection with the county of Hampshire and the Hampshire Regiment. At the time of her birth, her father was Colonel of the Isle of Wight Rifles, having previously seen

active service during the First World War on the Somme and before that at Gallipoli where he had captured a Turkish fort and was wounded during the battle of Krithia.

Rosan was a lifelong member of the Gallipoli Association, honouring the memory of those terrible landings. In 2015 she was one of only 15 relatives of Gallipoli veterans who were selected to attend the centenary commemorations to meet Princes Charles and Harry on HMS Bulwark moored off the Turkish coast.

Her childhood years were spent in the countryside outside Fareham. She was an intrepid and accomplished horsewoman who rode with the Hambledon Hunt for which she became Hunt Secretary when she was living in Dundridge. After some punishing falls and many broken bones, she reluctantly hung up her riding boots in the 1990s.

After her schooling, Rosan trained as a dietician; first in Bath and subsequently in London. Her professional career started in the Middlesex and Brompton hospitals. She then moved back to Hampshire to the Lord Mayor Treloar Hospitals and the newly opened Basingstoke Hospital. Whilst she was nursing her mother at home near Fareham, she met Geoffrey Porter who was the locum GP. They married in 1979 and bought Gaston Wood Farm, Upper Wyke, in 1980 when Geoffrey became a locum GP for St Mary Bourne. They were married for 32 years until sadly Geoffrey died following a stroke in 2011. Rosan retired from her work at Basingstoke Hospital in 1996 aged 62.

Throughout her life, Rosan was passionate about animals. Firstly horses, and then almost any animal, especially if it was black. During her years at Gaston Wood, Rosan developed a small herd of Aberdeen Angus cattle. She subsequently acquired an international reputation as a breeder and judge of the breed. She travelled extensively to visit herds in Scotland and England, the US and Argentina, and enriched the gene pool of the British stock by introducing genes from American pedigrees. Locally she enlisted the children of neighbours, as well as family, to help show her cattle at the Newbury Show and she even advised the King (when he was still Prince of Wales) on the breeding of Aberdeen Angus cattle. When Rosan could no longer deal with herd management at Gaston Wood, she generously donated her animals to "Jamie's Farm" - a charity which gives the opportunity to children with no previous experience of rural life to live and work for a week on a farm. The charity has now expanded to having seven "Jamie's Farms" in the UK.

Over the years, Gaston Wood saw a long line of her favourite black labradors. Rosan became actively involved with the Labrador Lifetime Trust which helped to rehome dogs when circumstances required it. Many local people are very grateful for her help in finding a much-loved family pet for them. >>>

Recently Rosan became increasingly frail. Some falls at her home precipitated a series of stays in Basingstoke hospital, where she died peacefully on October 2nd.

The service at St Peter's on 12th November was filled with people who came to pay tribute to someone who had made a significant contribution to their lives. Rosan was intelligent, accomplished and forthright. She was loved and respected in many different spheres: family and friendships, medicine, hunting and horsemanship; military history, and farming. She had wide-ranging cultural tastes. She recognised quality and always maintained a lively interest in other people and their

Rosan Porter - a generous and independent spirit, whose exhortation to others to "live dangerously" will live on in the hearts of all who knew and loved her.

Oliver Michael Palmer Madge 14th January 1970 - 14th October 2025

Oliver Madge sadly passed away on 14th October 2025 aged 55. Oliver, known to his friends as Oli, moved to St Mary Bourne in April 2016 with his wife, Lara. They both became active members of the community, with Oli being on the committees of the Flower Show and the Village Centre, as well as being a member of the Parish Council which he Chaired for a short while, taking over when it needed help and building up again.



Oli has been described as 'one of the good guys, always ready to help out when and where needed, a genuine animal lover, a strong supporter of community events with a true sense of justice and fair play.'

Another letter of condolence quoted 'When I think of Oli, I don't just think about the kindness and the all-round good bloke-iness of the man but also his loyalty and steeliness when faced with the rubbish that life sometimes serves up. His deftness in dealing with the everyday drama on the Parish Council, to being central in a plan just coming together, usually for the benefit of others was a privilege to watch."

Oli was committed to village life and was often shot down for trying to enhance village amenities like the lake, the use of the cricket pavilion and the Village Centre. Oli truly believed that it was better to get involved with village life than sit on the side lines and complain about it.

Outside village life, Oli carved a fantastic career within the Pest Control industry, becoming the youngest Chair of The British Pest Control Association (BPCA) at the age of 36. He became the 'go to' for the media whenever anything "pest related" was reported upon, and had a regular spot on BBC's Rogue Traders as well as starring in Big Brothers Little Brother, Sarah Beeny's Property Ladder, BBC News programmes and Jeremy Vine Show. He founded the consultancies Pestwise and IPM Central excelling at instruction, training and technical contribution as well as co-founding the Bed Bug Foundation and creating a code of practise for the industry.

He has been described as a leading force in the Pest Control industry and a key figure in advancing pest control standards across the UK by the BPCA.

In May last year, Oli and Lara moved to Cornwall with one eye on taking life a lot less seriously. Unfortunately, Oli was diagnosed with Stage 4 cancer shortly after the move. Undeterred, Lara and Oli threw themselves into Cornish life becoming Gig Rowers with the local village team and making many new friends. In April, they bought a motorboat to discover the Cornish coast and to make the most of the time they had left. They were able to enjoy a glorious summer entertaining friends and settling into Cornish life.







LONGPARISH WILDLIFE THE MINK

I thought I would tell you about mink as we have one in the village at the moment. The mink we have are not native, they are actually American mink brought in for fur farming. Mink farms have been established in the UK since 1920 and expansion of the industry resumed after WW11. At its peak in the 1950s there were 400 known farms in the UK. Mink were first confirmed to be breeding in the wild in 1956. By December 1967 wild mink was present in over half of the counties in the UK. The fur farming in the UK was subject to increasing statutory restrictions, from 1975 until it was finally



banned completely in 2000. The few fur farms still operating at that time had been the focus of attacks by animal rights

activists. There was a mink farm at Rooksbury Mill in Andover. In August 1969 intruders broke into the farm and released 1000 mink from their cages. Farm workers and pest officers managed to capture many, but a number escaped into the wild. The mink had a devastating effect on native wildlife, particularly the water vole. This deadly predator may look cute. It has a long-streamlined body very similar to the ferret and range from light to dark brown with distinctive white patches on their chin and throat. They are mostly nocturnal or active at dusk and have a life span of 10-12 years. Mink will eat Eels, Perch, Trout and young Salmon, as well as Coots, Moorhens and Ducks. They have also been known to hunt Rabbits, Rats, Mice, Voles and Frogs. Mink mate in February and give birth 40-60 days later. Young Mink are called Kits and each litter comprises of 3-7. They are weaned at 8 weeks and finally become independent by 14 weeks.

Sylvia Mary Marguerite Snow (Mary)

July 4, 1920 - November 10,2025

Mary was born at Church Farm, Longparish in 1920, the second child of Cobden and Sylvia Snow. The family

moved to Southside Farm soon afterwards where Mary enjoyed an idyllic country childhood. When war threatened in 1939, Mary abandoned her intention of becoming a Norland Nurse, signing up for the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service. After training, and time billeted in London, she was posted in1943 to Hardwick Hall in Derbyshire. There she was involved in the administration of the newly formed (highly secret) parachute regiment. When peace came, she was posted to Belgium where she and her colleagues had the harrowing job of sorting through documents to be returned to the families of the young men who did not make it home.

Despite the awfulness of war, Mary remembered those years with affection, meeting people of her own age and serving her country. She was good at sports, enjoying tennis and playing for an ATS hockey team.

After being de-mobbed, she did secretarial training and was PA to the Managing Director of Standard Telephones and Cables in Southampton for 23 years. She retired to her bungalow at Highfield, Longparish in 1980.

Mary enjoyed retirement to the full, pursuing hobbies including gardening, tapestry, drawing and painting. Immersed in village life, she served as secretary to the PCC for many years. Her sketches of Longparish featured on Parish Magazine covers



and in the village handbook and she designed the Longparish panel of the Test Valley Tapestry. Mary loved all animals,

and friends will remember her mischievous Cairn terrier, Hamish, her beloved companion for many years.

Mary moved to Millway House Residential Home in 2020, aged 99. Covid regulations curtailed 100th birthday celebrations, though messages from friends and congratulations from Queen Elizabeth

and latterly King Charles, were much prized. She will be very much missed by her family and friends.

MOZART REQUIEM

Were you fortunate enough to attend the concert given by The Longparish Choir and Friends on 14th and 15th November held at All Hallows Church, Whitchurch, you would have been enthralled.

This particularly challenging work, originally scored for choir and orchestra was presented instead, with organ accompaniment.



The performance was truly stunning: one would not expect a group of amateurs however talented, to produce such a powerful sound, particularly so, considering the rather dry acoustics. The

balance between the sections was excellent as was the sympathetic organ accompaniment.

The interplay between soloists was thoroughly convincing. I was quite taken with the Bass soloist who gave us a rich, deep and utterly professional account.

The Requiem, which Mozart came to believe was to be performed upon his death, opened confidently with a full sound which was quite unexpected and hinted that we were in for a real treat.

In the Kyrie, again a dynamic opening by the men and responded to beautifully by the women. Here, Mozart wrote a double fugue with running semiquavers which is demanding on any choir as strict accuracy is required to achieve the clarity the composer called for.

The text in the Confutatis called for a vigorous attack _ 'when the accursed are confounded...' and here the choir excelled bringing realism to the text.

In contrast, the Lacrimosa, of which only the first eight bars are attributed to Mozart, was performed with much pathos; the melodic line floating ever upward.

The Sanctus, entirely composed by Mozart's pupil, Sussmayr and written in the tonic major (D major), opened with a glorious burst of energy which led majestically to a wonderful rendering of the contrapuntal passages which followed.

The Agnus Dei with its chromatic melodies reminiscent of Mozart's Mass in C, gave the choir the opportunity to observe perfect intonation and dynamic contrast. Both these disciplines were achieved and so we were led to the final movement, Communio, which harked back to thematic material from the first two movements. This towering movement, demanding huge reserves of stamina and concentration, coming as it does at the conclusion of the Requiem, presents the ultimate challenge to every

choir. I am delighted to report that the Longparish and Friends Choir were magnificent in its rendition to the very last note.



This will be the shortest day of the year with only 9 hours and 17 minutes of daylight and will mark the beginning of our Astronomical Winter.

anebury Hillfort - Crunchy Leaves and Crisp Views. Out and About Dog Walks with Bob Lethaby.

People ask why do I walk so much? And do I ever actually work? Well, walking clears the head, lifts the mood, and keeps my working cocker spaniel from staging a one-dog mutiny. He'd happily march to John O'Groats and back, wagging his tail, as if to say, "Where next?"

One of my favourite local walks is Danebury Hillfort, between Middle Wallop and Stockbridge. Autumn and Winter are magic here. There are no pheasants, so my dog mostly behaves, and the quiet allows you to hear your own thoughts, or at least the wind singing through the trees. Midweek is an ideal time to visit, as weekends can attract the masses, which isn't really my thing. There are two car parks and the occasional coffee van for emergency caffeine.

I usually park at the bottom, tackle the lung-busting climb, loop past the trig point, and take both the lower and upper circular routes. On wet chalk, the upper path becomes a slapstick stage: I once gave a small audience an impromptu display of splits followed by a face plant. Who knew walking could be so dramatic?

Autumn brings a golden tunnel of trees on the lower path; winter delivers crisp views across Hampshire vineyards towards Longstock and Chilbolton. Birdwatchers can spot kestrels, kites, bullfinches, and flocks of redwings and

fieldfares munching on winter berries. Highland cows and Shetland ponies wander the top, adding charm, making for great photography.



I highly recommend Danebury Hillfort: fenced, safe, mostly pheasant-free, and full of life. Whether it's crunching leaves in autumn or sparkling frost in winter, it's a perfect place to stretch your legs, take in the scenery, and laugh at yourself (and your dog) along the way.



THE HISTORY OF HURSTBOURNE PRIORS

he History of Hurstbourne Priors was a special event hosted by the Parish Council on 25th October. County Archaeologist David Hopkins presented the history of the archaeology in Hurstbourne Priors, and its surrounding area, and its development with a fascinating talk accompanied by plenty of maps and pictures so we could envisage what 'our' valley used to look like.



BARBARA CARRODUS

Extract from the Eulogy given by Barbara's husband Jim Vyse at her thanksgiving service on 13 September 2025



Many will know what I mean by 'Word of the Month Barbara'. For over three years Barbara submitted words and their definitions to Hill and Valley: a treasure trove created by a *logophile_*- someone who loves words.

Barbara's first word (delivered to a group of us at a village Safari Supper) was *frondescence* - that time when a plant unfolds its leaves creating a green haze. We then had *pssithurism* - the rustling/whistling sound of wind moving through trees and leaves and this had to be followed by *abscisson* – the natural detachment of parts of a plant, typically dead leaves and ripe fruit which Barbara enjoyed collecting and preserving (there are still leaves under our carpets). Many photos show Barbara sitting in, admiring and hugging trees and, speaking from experience, could she hug!!

We were often asked how we met – Barbara was very proud that we were among the early adopters of internet dating, and we first met at Stourhead on March 26^{th} 2005.

On that first date we did *obambulate* - to walk about or wander - aimlessly around the lake, while Barbara tried to explain to me her newfound interest in pilates. Later we sat talking, outside Stourhead Church, in the *apricity* - the warmth of the sunshine in winter (well just into early spring).

Barbara's dear mother Jean, observing 'You have had rather a lot of boyfriends, Barbara' was curious to know how we met. Summoning up some of Barbara's *vespertine* — of or occurring in the evening - activities - she drew on her history as an *aristologist* — person who studies/practices the art or science of dining - as well as, luckily, *eupepsia* — lack of indigestion - to explain that we had met at one of the supper clubs she attended (it was a bit difficult to explain why there was a supper club at Stourhead during the day!). One of those supper clubs was organised by her friend Anthea, with whom she went on to work in her picture framing business at Chilton Foliat before joining me at Fox farmyard where she set up her own workshop.

So we begin to build a picture of someone who was *logodaedalus* – one who uses language with cleverness and skill, who unfortunately sometimes displayed *velleity* – an inclination not strong enough to lead to action - who never displayed *triskaidekaphobia* or *friggatriskaidekaphobia* – phobia of the number 13 or of Friday 13th and, despite the restrictions of her illnesses had *confelicity* – delight in another person's happiness or good fortune. While procrastination never featured, she was often obliged to *scurryfunge* - to frantically tidy up before an unexpected visitor arrives.

A tidiness which unfortunately often tended to be *fugacious* – quick to disappear. Strangely there are no words associated with her love of dogs especially black labradors, which gave her so much pleasure.

After her own dogs Prince and Meg, she moved on to house and dog sitting. Barbara became a beloved Fairy Dogmother for her last few years. Nor are there any words relating to her skills of photography, which she studied at Basingstoke College. While never taking up photography professionally, she produced thousands of images of plants and gardens as well as land and skyscapes. The quirky, slightly bonkers in a lovely way (as at least one of her friends described her) aspect of her character led her to produce a series of rear views of photographic subjects especially of other photographers creating images or featuring people at events such as Ladies' Day at Ascot and weddings. There are many, many digital images to sort through as well as film and slides. Instead, Barbara had a very successful period of her life as an area manager for Betterware for most of Berkshire, Hampshire, Wiltshire and Surrey.

Barbara was evangelistic about her Carrodus musical heritage and amassed a wealth of history about their connections with various orchestras and institutions.

The zenith of her interest came when she found that The Carrodus violin once owned and played by her great, great grandfather John Tiplady Carrodus was bought from a private collection in America and loaned to Richard Tognetti, leader of the Australian Chamber Orchestra. Barbara ensured that he appreciated the family history and attended concerts when the instrument was in the UK.

Mellifluous – of a sound – pleasingly smooth and musical to hear. Recently, I attended a BBC Prom at the Albert Hall, where the Carrodus Violin was played by its new keeper, the South Korean violinist, Inmo Yang.

Barbara had an eclectic choice in music, influenced by her adolescence during the Paul McCartney era and her father's desire to listen to high quality reproduction of a wide range of music, shaped by his Carrodus heritage.

Barbara helped organise musical events at St Andrew's. She poured love and family heritage into a range of concerts both solo and by groups. She was especially proud of helping to organise and promote 'The Return of Sir Hubert Parry to Hurstbourne Priors'.

Hubert Parry specified the organ in this Church and the Centenary of its inauguration was commemorated in 2006. Hubert Parry was father-in-law of village resident and famous baritone Harry Plunket Greene. Barbara's great grandfather, Robert Carrodus, appeared on concert platforms with Harry Plunket Greene and the tenor Gervaise Elwes in whose memory the predecessor of the charity Help Musicians was founded. Barbara's ashes now lie in a grave next to Harry Plunket Greene in St Andrew's churchyard. Barbara did not have a passport in later years. With the onset of her low level lymphoma, she felt it was unwise to challenge her immune system. In not travelling she was not going to *periclitate* – expose or put herself in a perilous situation. This was not due to *ochlophobia* – extreme or irrational fear or dislike of crowds, although she always said she was a bit of a hermit, but rather to cultivate *grith* - peace, security or sanctuary.

So we find Barbara loving to make regular trips to rural locations and more especially to her beloved Lyme Regis where she could exercise *villaggiatura* – a prolonged leisurely holiday, often spent in a countryside or seaside setting, focused on rest and recreation and one should add her generosity in sharing these times with friends and family.

May our memories of Barbara have *rutilance* - glow or glitter with a golden light and may we all be joyful that Barbara was able to *laetificate* - to make joyful and enrich all our lives.
